Citizens' Committee Censures District Attorney for Allowing Escape.

Criticism of District Attorney John Manning and other public officials who have not closed the questionable medical institutions of the city, and who allowed Ernest Heymans, the manager of the notorious X-Radium Institute to escape after the death of Golda Rowland, was freely passed at the meeting yesterday afternoon of the special committee of clergymen and physicians chosen to suppress these institutions.

Although no formal action was taken by the committee as a whole, individuals expressed their indignation that no action was taken by the district attorney toward arresting Heymans, although he had been visited by the committee and had been informed that the girl died in the institution.

Several of the committee stated that they understood on excellent authority that Heymans was now in the city and was being protected by the influence of certain physicians.

Dr. William Eisen, in a statement made before the committee, declared that he personally knew of four murders that had been committed in the city, and that he would report to the committee as to the city officials would take no action against him.

The committee on advertising reported that they had visited the newspapers and were making progress.

Dr. E. F. Tucker, chairman of the committee, appointed the following committee of investigation: Dr. E. C. Pohl, Dr. Allan Welch Smith and Rev. Dr. Luther B. Dyott. To this committee the actual work of investigation will be left, and it will report to the main committee at its meeting next Friday.

Dr. Smith reported that the city attorney's office, through him, would offer its aid in every way possible.

SKETCHES OF PORTLAND PASTORS

Rev. S. Earl DuBois, pastor of the Church of the Strangers, corner of Grand avenue and Wasco street, was born in Belmont county, Ohio, received his common school education in the city of Bellair; attended Muskingum college, which is located at New Concord, Ohio, a denominational college of the United Presbyterian church, graduating in 1893, and completed his theological course at Allegheny Theological seminary, graduating in 1896.

His first pastorate was at Superior, Nebraska, from whence he was called to Red Oak, Iowa, where he spent five and a half years, when he was called to the First United Presbyterian church of St. Louis, Missouri. After laboring most three years in this field, he was assigned to the field he now occupies, where he has been laboring for over two years with excellent results. During the year 1907 forty-two persons were received into the church of the Strangers.

Rev. DuBois believes that Christian friendliness has much to do in attracting people to the house of God and winning them to Christ, and in this respect he has been successful. He thought upon his people, with the happy result that strangers are always cordially received and returned. Quite a number have said to return. He had been in many churches, but had never received such a hearty welcome as they had in this. These are as they were engaged in passing on the good thing by welcoming others.

Christian Endeavor society has grown until it is one of the strongest in the life of the church. It is maintained by young men and women who have gladly and earnestly taken beyond question. The pastor says, if one wants his heart stirred, let him attend one of our Christian Endeavor meetings. The Sunday school is a constantly growing factor in the church of the Strangers.
