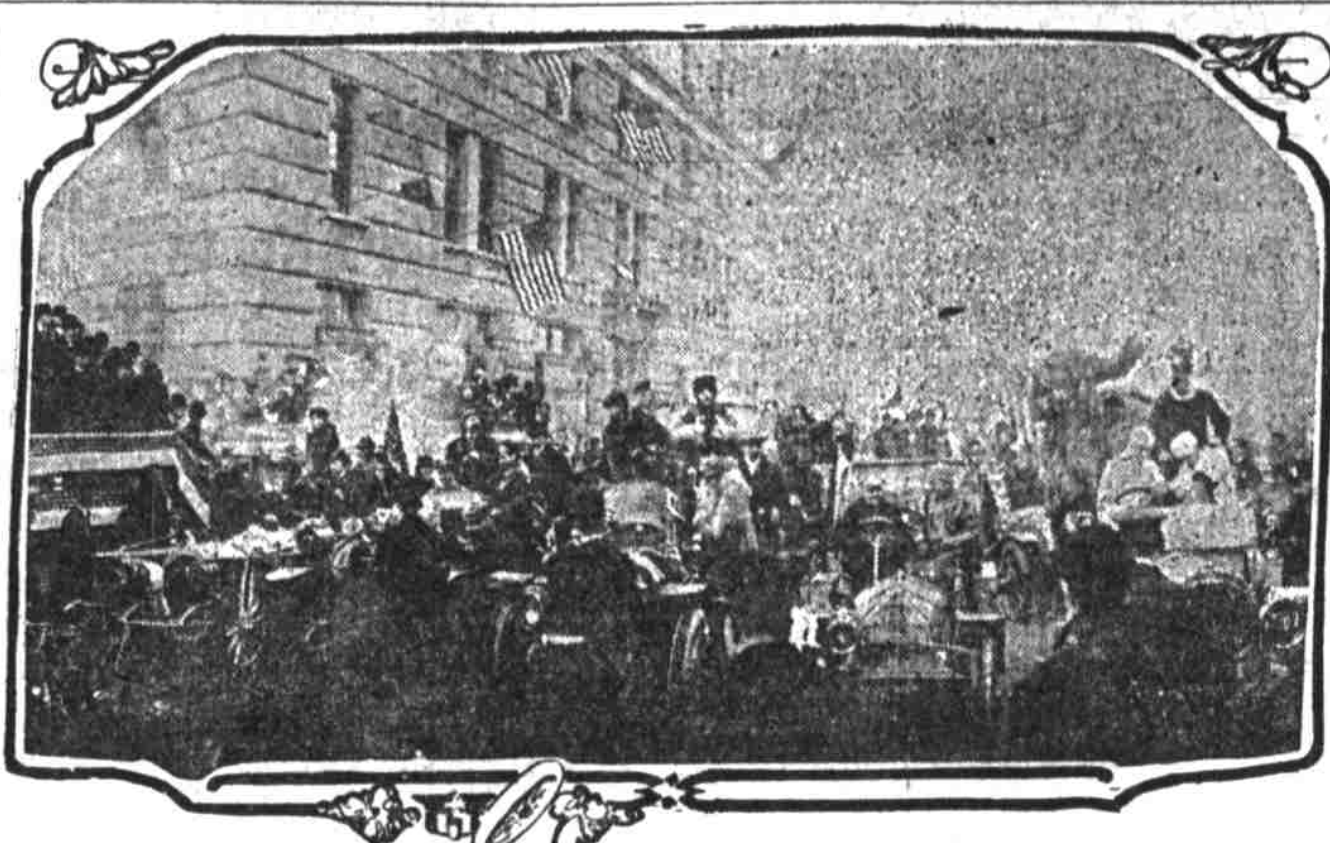


SPORTING NEWS OF THE WORLD
