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OLD SAILING RECORDS.

Speed in Ocean Travel, Shown by Some American Ships. Rowland Thomas in Boston Herald.

The most noteworthy performance of the Phelps, all things considered, is her run from Norfolk, Virginia, to Honolulu, a distance of 15,000 miles, which she covered in 27 days.

The Phelps also has to her credit a passage from New York to Java Head, 13,000 miles, in 80 days, averaging 16 1/2 miles per day.

For bursts of speed the Phelps' best is very good indeed. An hour run of 12 miles, a day's run of 120, and a run of 6,500 miles in 26 days, or an average of 250.
