Stanford Expects to Win Annual Track Meet From California Youngsters.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Stanford University, Palo Alto, Cal., Feb. 24.—Stanford's freshmen are showing enough class to warrant the belief that they will turn the tables on the blue and gold freshmen and break the hoodoo by bringing home a victory in the intercollegiate freshman track meet this year.

One of the freshmen is already the best quarter miler on the track. This man is Brown from Pomona preparatory school. He has defeated Miller, the Stanford star, twice this season and when he runs in the 400 yard race he is expected to do things like his brothers in the past have done.

For the mile and two-mile events no freshman as yet stands out conspicuously. The favorite for the mile is Thompson or Porter could be shifted to the mile, leaving Brown to take care of the half mile.

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President Sullivan Predicts Oregon Boy Will Break Prinstein's Record.

Many experts on athletics predict positively that H. F. Porter, the high jumper of the Irish American Athletic club, and Dan Kelly, the sprinter and broad jumper from the west, will each establish a new world's record in the "jumps" before the end of the outdoor athletic season of the year 1908, says the New York World.

President James E. Sullivan of the Amateur Athletic union is one of the men who has seen that the athletes in competition, and he declared yesterday that he believes both of the athletes will make new records in their specialties this summer.

"I think that Porter will come very near to establishing a record in the high jump," said the president of the union. "And I also believe that if Kelly trains faithfully it will not be long before he will be jumping dangerously close to the record made by Myer Prinstein."

Porter has also been showing remarkable progress in the road jump. He has not shown any surprising form as a sprinter, but he has often leaped farther than 20 feet in practice, and he has jumped higher than six feet in the high jump.

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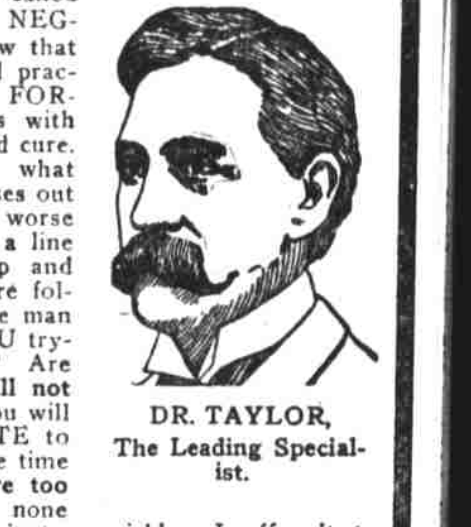
