WIMIRE CASE READY FOR JURY

JUROR PUTS POINTED QUERY TO ATTORNEY JOHN LOGAN

HIS DOUBT INDICATED

Asks Why Mayor Returned Second Time After Alleging That He Had Once Before Suffered a Repulse.

W. W. Church, a juror in the Waymire-Radding case, stands between the state and an acquittal, as was shown by the questions which he asked of John Logan, leading attorney for the defense, as he was closing his argument at noon today. No hint of the opinion of the belief of other members of the jury had been dropped or is known, but Mr. Church came out in the open today, making it practically certain that he at least will stand with the defense. This showing made just as the defense was saying its final words in defense of its clients caused a blush in the face of that side of the controversy and as a pleasing flash to the state.

Mr. Logan was just on the point of finishing his address, which had been an eloquent and a forceful one, when Mr. Church interrupted him. "I would like to have you explain something to me," he said. "I would like you to tell me how it was after Mayor Lano, according to Mrs. Waymire's story, had attempted to kiss and caress her on the afternoon of September 16 and had been repulsed and had apologized as he did, that he made a second attempt and such a violent one as it is said he made on the afternoon of September 26, is that natural for a man to come back the second time?"

"A man so inflamed by sensual passion would have come back 40 times," responded Mr. Logan. "Once enough for Kjm."

"No," said Mr. Church, "I would not have gone back the second time after I had been repulsed, as it is said the mayor was."

JAPANESE SEEK TO RETALIATE

Import Duty on Crude Oil Will Be Raised 80 Per Cent—Raise in Duty Blow to the Standard Oil Company.

Other American Houses Are Affected—China Seeking Protection and Looks to United States—Diplomats Watch Developments.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Washington, D. C., Feb. 25.—The following cable has been received here:

"Tokio, Feb. 25.—Japan is about to give evidence of her real feelings toward the United States. The first blow to be delivered at American enterprises is aimed at the Standard Oil company. A bill increasing the import duty on crude oil 80 per cent is expected to be favorably reported to the diet. The firm of Samuel & Co., Standard Oil representatives here, are making a bitter fight to defeat the bill but it is thought that their efforts will prove unavailing.

Crude and refined oils are among the largest American imports into Japan. Cotton, flour and lumber follow in order. Millions of dollars worth of oil have been contracted for and much of it is being imported by American houses that stand to lose vast sums of money if the revised tariff bill goes through.

Japan is becoming more and more aggressive in her relations with China and is evidently playing a double game with the United States. It is believed among Europeans here that the United States is fully cognizant of Japan's double dealings and is about to protest vigorously, backed morally by Germany, France and possibly England.

With the arrival of Ambassador Takahira, successor to Japanese Ambassador Aoki, and Wu Ting-fang, the new Chinese minister to the United States, there is expected an entirely new phase of the diplomatic relations existing between Japan and China, with the orient as the center of interest. Diplomats in Washington who have been watching the situation assert that Japan will very likely take the rear of the stage because of her financial troubles, while China presents an entirely independent policy as regards Japan's attitude in the Manchurian trouble.

Speaker Cannon by the United Press association. "Dear sir—Widespread circulation has been given a report that you have refused to consider the advisability of starting a complete investigation of the charges involving the Electric Boat company, newspaper representatives and members of congress. Our name has been brought into the matter through the admission of a United Press reporter in the house that he accepted a check from the boat company for an article created last August. It appears that he did not even try to foment the article upon our report and note of our papers received it. But we esteem the liking of our organization, which demands that employes must not attach themselves to outside interests, and dismissed him. We cannot believe that congress will hesitate to hear up the graver charges in which it is involved.
