

# NEED MORE PIPE LINES

### East Side Clubs Unit in Declaring Additional Conduit to Bull Run River Is Urgent Necessity—Further Delay Dangerous.

"Another improvement that must not be made subsidiary to the transportation across the river," says Whitney L. Boise, "is the installation of an additional pipeline to Bull Run river. We must have a new Madison street bridge, but at the same time we cannot afford to let the matter of a new conduit sleep. In my opinion it is altogether as urgent a matter as the rebuilding of the Madison bridge.

"How great would be the resulting catastrophe should our one lone pipeline give out some day, especially in the summer! Our people would be at once subject to the ravages of typhoid that would be disastrous to the future of our especially healthy city. It is because we have relied too much on our water supply. We could get no other water.

"Furthermore I believe it would solve the difficulties met with by all parts of the east side now trying to bring the water board around to their view at once. The city is spread out over 40 square miles of territory with prospects of growing. Mount Scott is a part of the city and the water question is one of the pertinent issues in their campaign for annexation. We are all aware of the possibilities of the water board. I believe petitions should be circulated at once so the new pipeline can be started within the year. We cannot get it too soon."

No other institution has received so much criticism at the hands of the east side clubs as the city water board. C. H. Rafferty has labored assiduously to correct wrong or exaggerated opinions regarding the capabilities of the water department before different east side clubs but still attacks are made. The remedy proposed is the abolishment of the board and the substitution of an elective commissioner of public works.

J. F. Ketchum of Sellwood said before the United East Side clubs: "The water board has been very unsatisfactory. Those of us who have gone to the water board have returned in an agitated state of mind such as is not even provoked by a visit to the council. We have been unable to get any satisfaction from the board and there seems to be none who can tell us the real difficulty."

It seems to be the opinion among leading east side clubs that the water board, the fire department and council are all working with different objectives ahead of them. Neither seems to know what the other is doing and the result is unsatisfactory. Members of the water board have on several different occasions been invited to attend the meetings of the federated clubs but none of them has attended except C. H. Rafferty.

Chief Campbell, Mayor Lane, Judge Webster, the county commissioners, members of the council and executive boards have at different times accepted invitations to attend meetings of the federated clubs and been put on the stand to answer questions but the water board has never answered an invitation. Chief Campbell made the statement that the fire department could follow only where the water board had gone and the water board is asked why it has not gone into some of the populous districts of the growing east side.

# PUBLIC'S PROTESTS HITS STONE EARS

### Council Ignores Property Owners' Wishes Regarding East Side Fill.

Despite the fact that a large number of residents were present at yesterday's council meeting asking to be heard on the East Sixth street fill proposition the council voted to lay the measure on the table. Councilman Bunting explained that the people present were property owners who had left their work in order to protest against rescinding the contract as asked for by the Inman-Poulsen Lumber company. As a result of yesterday's action the property owners fear that the council will take up the matter at some future time and pass it without giving them a chance to be heard on the question. George S. Shepherd, attorney for the company, has stated that his employees would fill in Grand avenue if the Sixth street fill be abandoned. This is not looked on favorably by the east side, who want Sixth street finished through from Washington to a point several blocks south of the gulch. All the rest of the improvement has been completed save the fill and the lumber company has been holding it up in the hope that the city will rescind its contract with the Pacific Bridge company. The council also refused to act on the matter of vacating several east side streets now occupied by the lumber company. This question was postponed until April 22.

# CITY NOT LIKELY TO OWN A ROCK CRUSHER

### Ordinance Now in Committee's Hands and Chloroform Bottle Is Open.

Although a special committee was appointed by the city council yesterday afternoon to investigate the purchase of rock crushers for Portland, it is considered improbable, in view of the sentiment expressed yesterday, that the crushers will ever be bought. The ways and means committee had already made a thorough examination of the project with the assistance of the members of the east side business clubs who have been investigating the feasibility of the project for more than a year.

An ordinance was introduced yesterday by the committee favoring the purchase of crushers and equipment and appropriating \$25,000 for the project. The ordinance was referred to the special committee consisting of Councilmen Bennett, Cellars and Menefee.

# JEFFREY'S PLATFORM BUILT WITH SUBSTANTIAL PLANKS



John A. Jeffrey, who has announced his candidacy for the Democratic nomination for congress from the second district, is a well known attorney of Portland. Mr. Jeffrey was born in Washington county, Arkansas, May 24, 1869. He came to Oregon in 1874, making his home at Jacksonville, where he attended the high school, later going to and graduating from the state agricultural college at Corvallis. After graduation Mr. Jeffrey taught school until 1896 when he was admitted to the bar and the same year elected to the legislature from Jackson county. He was elected district attorney for the first judicial district and filled that position until 1898. He then moved to Salem where he resided until 1904, when

he came to Portland where he has since lived. Mr. Jeffrey in announcing his candidacy has formulated the following statement of principles as the platform upon which he will stand in making his race for the nomination and election: "First—Reduce the tariff schedules now in force to a just and equitable rate. "Second—Provide a safe, secure and just banking law which shall guarantee the deposits of the people and protect the honest banker. "Third—Exclude from all the dominions of the United States cheap and undesirable Asiatic laborers. "Fourth—Reclaim all unearned public lands for the United States for actual settlers only. "Fifth—Provide and maintain a more efficient navy."
