

NO WAITS IN LINE OF ROSE PARADE

Children Are Not to Be Kept Standing in Streets—List of Awards.

In order to avoid any unpleasant features that characterized the parade of the children during last year's Rose Festival the Rose Festival association is making elaborate preparations to see that the children who march next June will have but a short distance to go and will not be required to stand in the hot sun.

A committee from the school board composed of Mrs. L. W. Stilton and Superintendent Hight has been named by the board to investigate the parade and report back to the school board before the board will agree to the parade.

About 10 per cent of the school children will be asked to take part in the parade and no children whose parents object are to be allowed to participate. The plan is to have the children make a short march, going through certain simple evolutions with decorated May poles and hoops and garlands of roses.

At last night's meeting of the Rose society the matter was discussed and the society declared that it favored the parade if it was properly conducted.

W. S. Sibson of Portland, was elected as the judge for the rose exhibition to represent Oregon. There will also be one judge chosen from California and another from Washington. Every effort is to be made to encourage amateur rose growers to participate in the exhibition and try for prizes.

It was decided to divide the city into districts at the time of the Rose Festival and appoint members of the society as special agents to collect all the roses in each district which are to be used in the festival.

The list of classes and rules for the exhibition next June was especially arranged for amateurs and is as follows:

For Amateurs.

Section A, class 1—To be exhibited in boxes, see rules, first and second premiums; No. 1, best six roses, separate named varieties; No. 2, best 12 roses separate named varieties; No. 3, best 24 roses, separate named varieties; No. 4, best general exhibit in this section.

Section B, class 2—No. 3, best 12 Caroline Testout; No. 4, best 24 Caroline Testout; No. 5, best 50 Caroline Testout.

Section C, class 3—Best four red roses, any one variety named; best four white roses, any one variety named; best six pink roses, any one variety named.

Section D, class 4—No. 1, best six La France (pink); No. 2, best six Ulrich Brunner; No. 3, best six Frau Karl Druschki; No. 4, best six Maman Cochet (pink); No. 5, best six Mrs. John Loring.

Section E, class 5—No. 1, best hybrid perpetual, named, any color; No. 2, best hybrid tea, named, any color; No. 3, best tea, named, any color; No. 4, best Marcelle Nicot, named, any color.

Section F, class 6—No. 1, best yellow hybrid tea, named; No. 2, best three yellow hybrid tea, named; No. 3, best yellow tea, named; No. 4, best three yellow tea, named.

Section G, class 7—No. 1, best collection six varieties, any color, four blooms of each; No. 2, best collection 10 varieties, any color, four blooms of each.

Section H, class 8—Best individual rose in the show, best general exhibit (section A excluded); best exhibit of new roses (not exhibited before 1907); best arranged exhibit (section A excluded).

Open to growers only who have never won a prize—12 blooms distinct varieties; five blooms one variety in a single vase; 12 bunches garden roses.

For Nurserymen.

Best general exhibit roses and shrubbery—First prize, \$100; second, \$50; third, \$25.

Best 48 varieties, each different—First prize, \$25; second, \$15; third, \$10.

Best 16 varieties, three each—First prize, \$15; second, \$10; third, \$5.

Best 12 bunches—First prize, \$25; second, \$15; third, \$10.

Rules for Amateurs.

Roses entered in section A must be exhibited in boxes of regulation size, viz: For six roses, 1 foot 3 inches long by 1 foot 6 inches high; for 12 roses, 2 feet long by 1 foot 6 inches wide, back 7 inches, front 5 inches high; for 24 roses, 3 feet 6 inches long by 1 foot 6 inches wide, back 7 inches, front 5 inches high; for 50 roses, 3 feet 6 inches long by 1 foot 6 inches wide, back 7 inches, front 5 inches high.

Each exhibit must consist of distinct varieties without duplication. The name of each rose must appear on neat cards about 3 inches long by 1 inch wide. Duplicates of any variety in any box will disqualify.

All other roses entered for competition may be displayed in boxes, vases or other receptacles, a number of which latter will be provided by Portland Rose society. All roses must have been grown in the open ground, and must be the bonafide property and grown by the exhibitor. The same rose or roses cannot be entered for more than one prize.

Exhibits must be in place on the tables not later than 11 o'clock a. m. on the day designated.

Exhibits as received will be numbered by the committee according to the respective section, class and number for which they are entered, and the prize will be awarded by number accordingly. The names of the exhibitors shall not appear on the exhibits until after the prizes have been awarded. Every exhibitor shall leave the building at 11 a. m. when the judges shall examine the exhibits and award the prizes, and at 2 o'clock p. m. or as soon thereafter as practicable the show will be opened to the public.

"Amateurs" is intended to mean those who do not sell or grow any flowers or Any roses improperly classed, named

or entered, or which have any added foliage, or which do not conform to the rules and regulations, will be disqualified and ruled out of the contest. When a certain number of roses is designated in any competition, there must be neither more nor less than that number entered or exhibited.

The judges may decline to award a prize to any exhibit which they consider unworthy of reward, even where said exhibit is the only one in its class or section.

It is understood that persons who enter roses for competition do thereby commit them to the approval and assent to the foregoing rules and regulations.

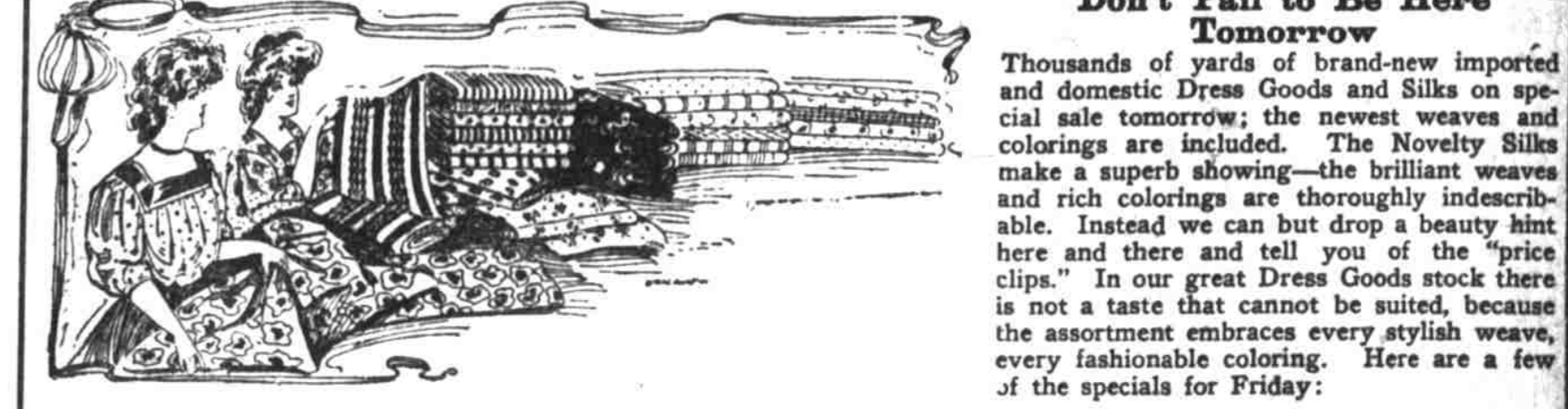
