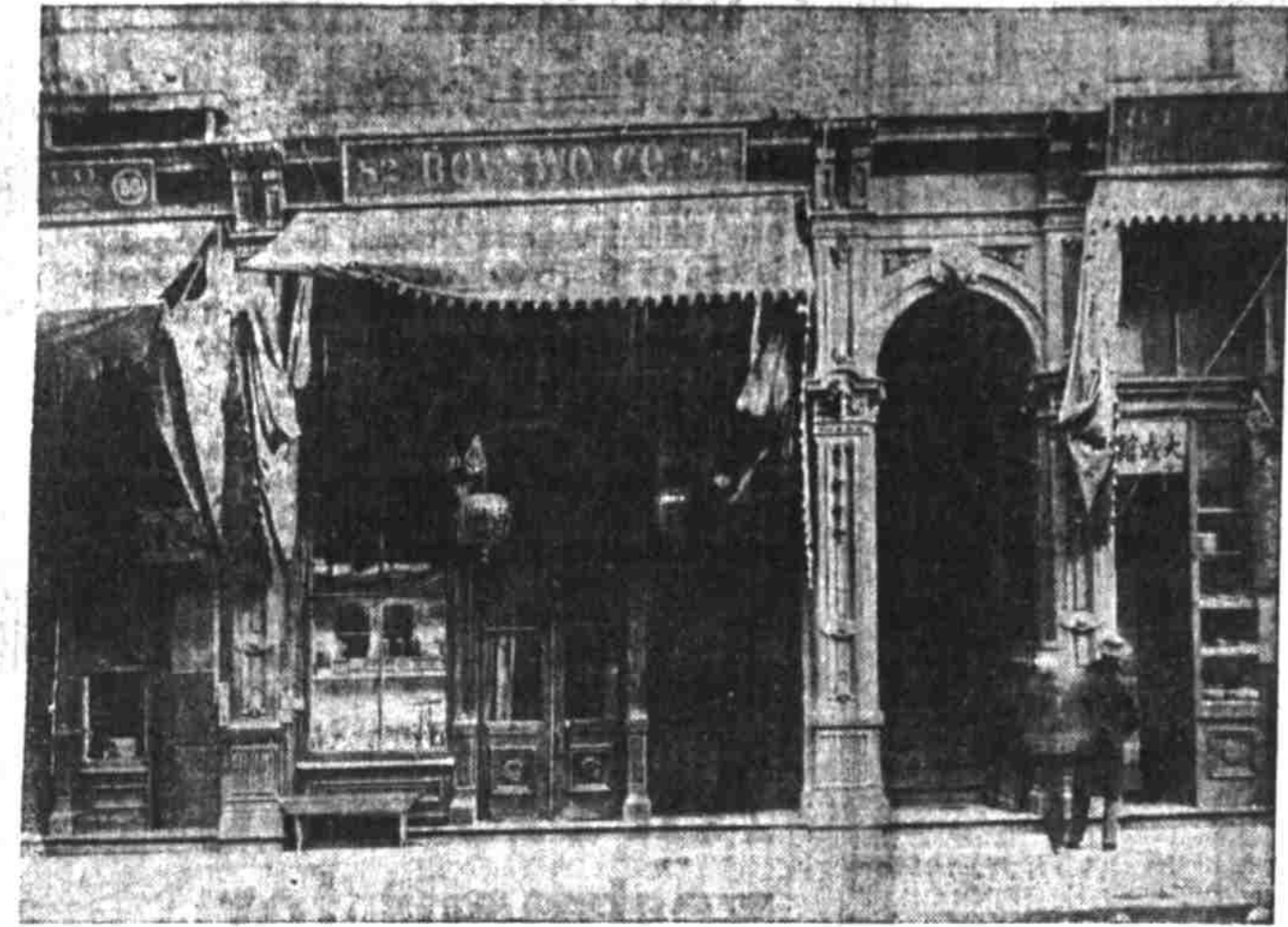


Chinese Lottery Runs Full Blast Within Few Feet of Station GAMBLERS NOT DISTURBED Police "Arrange" Raid Giving Players Whole Day to Get Wise



Bo Wow store, where lottery game was in progress and gamblers going in and out within plain view of officers in station across street, who yesterday "arranged" raid for today.

"Arrangements" have been made by the police to raid the Chinese lottery joint at 32 1/2 Second street, 100 feet distant and within plain view from the police station.

This was the statement made at 1:30 o'clock yesterday afternoon when Acting Detectives Kay and Smith were informed that a lottery drawing was being conducted at that moment at the place designated and within five-score feet of where the officers were standing.

Yesterday morning it became known that Chief Gritzmacher had withdrawn Detectives Price and Coleman from Chinatown and had detailed Acting Detectives Kay and Smith in their place and stead.

Advance Information Leaks Out.

That the Chinese gamblers had advance information of this change seemed evident from the fact that the "lid" came off in the quarter early in the day, and at 10 o'clock in the morning no less than 14 lottery companies held drawings. These operations were repeated at different hours throughout the day. Three big fantan and pie gow games were running continuously throughout the afternoon and evening, and smaller games were conducted intermittently at various places.

Diagonally across Second street from police headquarters is the establishment of the Bo Wow Co., certain members of which firm have for long enjoyed the reputation of being the backbone of some of the wealthiest lottery companies doing business in the Chinese quarter. On one of the floors above the store conducted by this firm is located one of the most extensive gambling establishments in Chinatown. Its proprietor is Jue Sue, the notorious Chinese gambler, who conducts several establishments of a similar character and who has at times achieved notoriety through the "present" he has made to white friends in official life. In justice to him it should be stated that no sworn proof has ever been produced to substantiate the charge that he is the collector and dispenser of the "protection fund" that is being paid by Chinese boss gamblers.

It is this gambling resort over the store of the Bo Wow company that the police have made "arrangements" to raid. At the time the statement concerning "arrangements" was made a dribbling stream of Chinese gamblers was flowing in and out of the street entrance to the resort past the "lookout" stationed at the door. All was within plain view from the windows of the police station and so close at hand that by a little stretching of arms and imagination the chief and the lookout could have shaken hands across the intervening space. Had a raid been ordered, between 50 and 100 Chinese gamblers would have been snared. But the raid was not ordered because of the "arrangements."

In times past when the lid was off in Chinatown and the gamblers were in the full enjoyment of purchased "protection," the word "arrangements" was not an idle one. It had to do with what is known in police parlance as a "frame up," or a "phony" raid. The place to be raided was notified in advance that a raid would be made at a certain hour.

The keeper of the place would have three, four or five dummy gamblers in attendance and when the "moral squad" arrived these dummies would be gathered in and later subjected to fines in the police court. If no "arrangements" were made and a legitimate raid was conducted the police would be likely to catch from 25 to 100 gamblers. The police court fines in such an event would amount up to a pretty penny and would make the business of persistent violation of the law extremely unprofitable.

The only wholesale and legitimate raids that have been conducted at Chinatown have been made by the personnel of the forest service for the county included in the new district. These changes will take effect March 15. places that are popularly supposed to provide the bulk of the protection fund. For many months, were carried out by Detectives Batty, Price and Coleman, under orders from Captain Bruin. These raids were made on information provided by persons outside the police department. They were conducted without the knowledge of the members of the so-called moral squad—Acting Detectives Kay and Keelin—who were assigned to the work of suppressing Chinese gambling by Chief Gritzmacher. These raids, which were productive of a wholesale harvest of fines, deepened the bitter feeling already existing between Chief Gritzmacher and Captain Bruin. They also put an end to Chinese gambling for the time being.

But not for long. Bruin got his orders to keep out of Chinatown, and the gamblers rejoiced. Then came the order, promulgated about 10 days ago, detailing Detectives Price and Coleman to Chinatown. Gambling stopped and the lid closed with intervals as a sort of test of the new order of things.

Lid Is Lifted.

During one of the brief intervals Price and Coleman swooped down on the lottery game at 32 Second street and captured the notorious Jue Sue and four of his henchmen, who were in the act of conducting a lottery game. The gamblers pleaded guilty and contributed \$25 each to the city's finances in the shape of fines.

As he was in the act of paying the fines Jue Sue used some variegated language in expressing his disapproval of the new order of things, as well as his determination to "see about it." This was three days ago. Yesterday Price and Coleman were taken out of Chinatown, Kay and Smith were put in charge, the lid was lifted and Jue Sue conducted lottery drawings within a few score feet of Chief Gritzmacher's office undisturbed—pending "arrangements."

OREGON APPLE KING OF FRUIT

High Prices for Yellow Newtowns Sold in London Recently.

That the Oregon apple is supreme in every section of the world has been noted time and time again. It now transpires that not only are they in better demand than those from other sections but the price is actually three times as high as the best eastern product and over twice as high as apples grown anywhere else in the world.

In London the Oregon Yellow Newtown takes front rank on every occasion the price of all other apples being governed at all times by the value of the product from this state. The lead in price is always maintained—but sometimes is greater than at other periods. If Oregon apples are scarce they sell correspondingly higher no matter how great the stocks grown in other sections of the world.

London appetites always pay tribute to the worth of the Oregon apple; this tribute being shown in a substantial manner. News has just been received here that the best Oregon Yellow Newtowns recently sold in London at 18 shillings per box for the ordinary run of first quality while the best Maine quality sells at the same price per barrel. For best California apples the London market is 10 shillings per box.

MINISTER WU AT BAY CITY

Representative of China Says He Does Not Bring Appeal to America.

San Francisco, Feb. 23.—Wu Ting Fang, recently appointed Chinese minister to the United States, arrived this morning on the steamship Siberia, accompanied by an elaborate suite.

A delegation of prominent Americans and Chinese merchants boarded the Siberia when the vessel came out of quarantine and extended a formal welcome to the distinguished Chinese.

Mr. Wu was in an extremely pleasant mood when the reporters and photographers swarmed down upon him and smilingly answered the interviewers' questions.

"Of course, it is unnecessary for me to say that I am glad to return to America. My relations with your people have always been of a most pleasant nature and I have many friends here."

"The statement that I am bringing with me an appeal from China to the United States, asking the American government to aid my country in checking Japan's alleged encroachments in Manchuria, is untrue. As a matter of fact, the statements that Japan is shutting out foreign trade by discrimination in transportation rates are greatly exaggerated."

"So far as I have been able to learn, the emigration differences between the United States and Japan were also greatly magnified. When the two governments got together and presented arguments it was found that there was very little to arbitrate and the matter was quickly arranged."

Mr. Wu brought with him 30 Chinese students, who will enter various American universities.
