MILLS WILL NOT BE SHUT DOWN

Shingle Makers Will Probably Take Chances on Market Being Flooded.
(United Press Leased Wire.)
Seattle, Feb. 28.—At a mass meeting of the shingle manufacturers in this city yesterday evening, the advocates of continued manufacture by the mills practically secured a victory over those urging a complete close down until the middle of April. After spirited discussion between the advocates of the two lines of policy the matter was finally compromised by the nomination of a committee of three who are empowered to call another mass meeting whenever they deem it wise. The close down has been advocated by a considerable portion of the manufacturers as the only means of preventing the shingle market from becoming badly overstocked, with a consequent decline of prices.

ASTORIA CHARTER TO BE AMENDED

Astoria, Or., Feb. 28.—Pursuant to a resolution adopted at a recent session of the council, Mayor Wise has appointed a committee consisting of W. C. Leonard, chairman, C. H. Hansen, J. J. Robinson, George Kaboth and L. O. Bellard to prepare proposed amendments to the city charter which will be submitted to a vote of the people at the coming city election. The principal amendment under consideration is one to authorize the issuance of bonds for the purpose of constructing a bulkhead along the city front and filling in the islands by pumping sand from the channel or sluicing dirt from the hillsides.

WOMAN FATALLY BURNED BY WAX

Wife of Oakland Cabinet-Maker May Die From Her Injuries.
(United Press Leased Wire.)
Oakland, Cal., Feb. 28.—Mrs. Katrina Mielh lies in a hospital fatally burned by boiling and blazing wax that splattered onto her face, hands and arms from a pan.
Oscar Mielh, her husband, heroically fought to save her from flames that instantly enveloped her, though himself suffering from terrible burns.
Mielh, who is a cabinet maker, had set a pan of polishing wax on the stove at the couple's home. It began to run over and blaze up and he grasped the woman and started with it to the sink. As he did so the wax splattered out in a shower, and Mrs. Mielh, who was close by, was struck by the greater part of it. The woman's hair and clothing caught fire, and with her hair streaming in flames behind her, she ran from the house shrieking. Mielh grasped a blanket and wrapped her in it. She was hurried to the Emergency hospital in the police automobile, where every attention was given her.

DR. BRANDT SAYS DOGS CONVEY DIPHThERIA

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)
Boise, Idaho, Feb. 28.—Dr. F. H. Brandt of this city has just completed an important investigation into the possibility that dogs may be affected with diphtheria and communicate it through their mouths to persons. Experiments made by Dr. Brandt seem to prove that the disease may be so communicated and his report on the investigation aroused much interest among members of the Boise Medical society at a meeting just held. The experiments are the first of the kind ever made in the west. They were undertaken because of a suspicion that diphtheria had been communicated from one child to another in a Boise family through the mouth of a pet dog which was found to have the disease. The experiment was made by the inoculation of two guinea pigs with the bacilli from the throat of the dog, which was killed because of the strong evidence that it was affected with diphtheria.

TAXPAYING TO BEGIN IN CLATSOP MONDAY

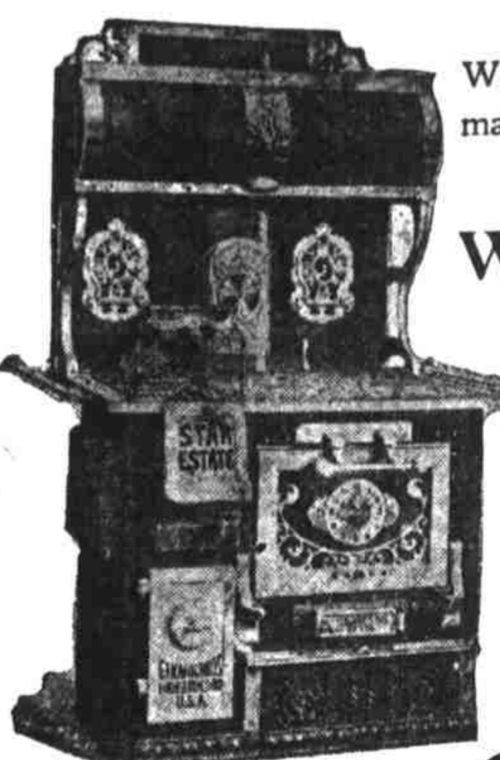
