STEELE'S HAND IN TITLE'S CASH BOX

Treasurer's Wife Owned Stock in Wrecked Bank's Subsidiary Company.

Added light was thrown on the connection of State Treasurer George A. Steele with the tangle of the wrecked Title Guarantee & Trust company in the federal court this morning when W. C. Bristol made application for the settlement of the account of the Home Security & Investment company.

At that time it was stated that Mrs. Eva Steele, wife of the state treasurer, owned practically all of the stock of the Home Security & Investment company, which is a subsidiary corporation of the Title company.

According to the statement of the district attorney made at the hearing, the Home Security & Investment company was formed as a subsidiary organization under the wing of the Title Guarantee & Trust company, originally all the stock in the concern being held by Mrs. Eva Steele.

Prior to the failure of the bank the Home Security company purchased lot 2 of block 57, being property in the business district. The Home Investment company borrowed \$13,000 of the Title Guarantee & Trust company with which to swing the deal, giving in return for the money, a mortgage on the property.

Consumers of city water who are found to waste the liquid that flows from Bull Run are likely to find themselves minus a supply of any kind, according to a decision reached by the water board yesterday afternoon. This ruling was made when the members discovered that the recent decision by Judge John B. Cleland of the state district court in which he said that the city could not use both the meter and flat rate in determining the consumers' bills meant a loss of about \$2,100 a month to the city.
