

DENVER RATES ARE NOT HIGH

Convention City Refutes Charges That Hotels Have Advanced Prices.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Denver, Colo., March 3.—Charges have been made in eastern newspapers that the rates for hotel accommodations in Denver during the Democratic national convention will be exorbitant.

The complaints originated in Chicago. It was published in some of the Chicago newspapers that Denver has not ample accommodations for the delegates and visitors to the convention.

Chairman Shafroth waited on all of the leading hotel owners, secured plans of their rooms and a schedule of their rates. He reminded the proprietors that the Hotel Men's association had given a guarantee to the Democratic national committee that there would be no increase in the transient rates.
