not prosecuted at the December term of court, that being the term next following the date of indictment. Judge Cleland said that it was a matter of common knowledge that because of the bank holidays, there was no December term of court. The court said that the purpose of requiring proceedings to be taken at the next term of court is to secure a speedy trial to persons accused of crime, but that it would not be in accord with the purpose of the law to virtually acquit the defendants without giving the state an opportunity to try them.

Wallace McCamant, attorney for Ross, and Harrison Allen, for others of the defendants, were in court to hear the decision. At the same time they hoped for a decisive victory went against them. But so many of their contentions had been sustained, that the attorney's handiwork was sufficient to keep the case open to prove its case as the matter now stands.

On the other hand, it appears that the defendants have only been granted another long breathing spell. The court has made it clear that good information can be drawn, and it may be presumed that in time the district attorney will bring the cases to trial. So far, on these three cases, over three months' time has been lost, and if similar progress is made in the future, the trials cannot be reached before the June term of court.

One case, that charging the acceptance of deposits after the defendants knew the bank to be insolvent, remains to be passed on by demurrer. This involves an entirely new question, and was heard by Judges Gantenbein, O'Day and Bronaugh, who arranged to confer on the matter today. It would not be surprising if the demurrer in this case is also sustained. This result will leave the district attorney exactly where he stood last November on each of the four cases.

Unlucky Numbers.

From London T. P. O. Why is 13 unlucky? It is usually stated that the superstitious objection to sitting 13 at a table in Christian countries was based on the fact of the last supper, when Christ and his 12 disciples sat down to eat together immediately before the Savior was seized by his enemies. But in the Norse mythology, which is supposed to antedate the introduction of Christianity among the Northmen, the superstition referred to the fact that at the banquet of the gods, Loki, the spirit of mischief, intruded himself, making 13 at the table, wherefore there was a fight, and Balbour, a young hero especially loved by the gods, was killed.

So far as France is concerned, it is the number 14 that has played a conspicuous and generally portentous part in her history. On May 14, 1564, the Rue de la Ferronnerie was enlarged by order of Henri II, and four times 14 years later Henri IV was assassinated there by David Ravaillac, namely, on May 14, 1610.
