National Convention of the Retail Association to be Invited to Come to Portland During the Rose Festival—Seattle to Assist.

Council Committee Will Recommend People Vote Sufficient Amount to Buy Site on East Side and Erect Plant.

Unless the unforeseen happens, the crematory committee of the city council will recommend that the people vote bonds at the coming election for a sufficient amount to purchase the site recommended by the health board at East Third and Everett streets, and also to cover the cost of constructing the crematory and establishing a municipal collection of garbage.

Eastern Washington will be the field of a big demonstration and educational campaign by the O. R. & N. company to encourage farmers to adopt improved methods of farming.

The train's equipment was selected today and will consist of an engine, one baggage car for exhibits, maps and literature, one coach for lecturing room, and one tourist car to guard against inconvenience arising from lack of sleeping accommodations.

Secretary Merrick of the Portland association has now on, says that all the Pacific coast states are in line for Portland, and that a united effort is put forth from now until May the convention can be held for this city.
