

TEAR FOR SAFETY OF STUDENTS

Sunnyside Club Discusses Danger Surrounding Pupils in Frame Buildings.

At a meeting of the Sunnyside Club last night the matter of the safety of the school children in the event of the breaking out of a fire in any one of Portland's large frame schoolhouses, was taken up. As the discussion was impromptu and came up only as a result of the fact that the accounts in the newspapers of the horrible disaster yesterday at Cleveland were yet in the minds of those present, no action was taken. It is very likely that the different east side clubs will take steps to insure greater safety against the occurrence of such a catastrophe in Portland.

Check Spread of Diphtheria.

An outbreak of diphtheria has started the residents of Sunnyside and steps will be taken at once by the Sunnyside club to seek out the cause. It is charged that the school and health authorities have not taken the ordinary precautions. The disease has not become serious, but further spread of the disagreeable affliction will be prevented.

At a meeting of the club last night a motion was made authorizing President J. T. Wilson to appoint a committee on health. Mr. Wilson will take the matter under consideration before making the appointments. It was thought for a while that the conditions about the school were not the most sanitary, but an investigation was made during the last few weeks and the health conditions have been found to be satisfactory as far as superficial inspection could reveal.

The club at Sunnyside has just been organized and is already plunging into the work of improving the health and beauty of the suburb. It is unique among east side clubs because women may become active members. Women have already been appointed to the standing committees. The organization will work in conjunction with the Federated East Side clubs and the delegates from Sunnyside that attended the last meeting of the Federated clubs reported last night that the organization of the east side clubs was an important one and asked for the federation the full support of the Sunnyside club.

Bylaws and a constitution were adopted last night completing the permanent organization of the club.

FARMERS TO BACK FAIR ASSOCIATION

Multnomah Organization Stock to Be Subscribed by Those Interested.

J. J. Johnson, E. L. Thorpe and E. L. Davis, incorporators of the Multnomah Fair association, have issued a prospectus relative to the scope and plans of the association and the farmers of Multnomah county and northern Clackamas are being asked to take stock. It is believed that it concerns greatly the success of the project whether the farmers themselves are willing to go behind it and support it both financially and otherwise.

It is set forth that the capital stock of the association is \$25,000 in shares of \$5 each. No person or corporation can own more than 60 shares of the capital stock, so effect must be given to the stock and it cannot be bought up. Much encouragement is felt by Mr. Johnson and the other incorporators, and it is firmly believed by them that they can depend on the reliable farmers of the county to support the project.

FREE LIBRARY PLANNED FOR ARLETA

Opposing Improvement Associations in Montavilla Unable to Get Together.

Montavilla, is one section of the great east side where push clubs, boards of trade, improvement associations and other progressive organizations do not flourish. In this respect Montavilla is very different from other portions of the east-of-the-river district. The history of the quarrels among the different factions in Montavilla is an interesting one and dates back for a number of years.

For long time there existed two organizations, the Montavilla board of trade and the Montavilla improvement association. Both were conscientiously endeavoring to help Montavilla. First they fought for annexation, then Bull Run water, both of which have now been secured. Because of continual discussions among the members as to the location of certain improvements and other matters there has always been more or less pulling in opposite ways detrimental to the upbuilding of the villa.

The suburb is much spread out, with Villa avenue at the north side and the Base Line road at the south side, both sections demanding improvement through their respective property owners. Last winter an effort was made to get together by consolidating the two organizations to be known as the Montavilla improvement board. For a few days it was thought the combination would be successful. An executive committee was appointed that did most of the work, but soon the other members lost interest. A week or so ago an effort was made to revive the old organization but the task was a hopeless one. Every encouragement was given the consolidation scheme but the united organization failed to prosper.

This week it is reported that a reorganization of the Montavilla board of trade has been brought about through the efforts of some of the members of the old body. It has been decided among them that more can be accomplished despite the opposition that will inevitably follow. The organization will, however, extend an invitation to all who may wish to avail themselves of the opportunity to come into the organization and assist in Montavilla. The officers of the board of trade are announced as follows: President, C. A. Evans; vice-president, Charles E. Kyle; secretary, Dr. William De Veen; treasurer, J. C. Morelock. The club will affiliate with the United East Side clubs. The new organization is a Villa avenue organization, having been brought into being in the Standard Broom factory building on Villa avenue.

GRADE SANDY ROAD THEN RENAME IT

Improvement League Will Hasten Work on Rose City Park Thoroughfare.

Steps looking toward the grading of Sandy road and having it renamed Rose City avenue were taken at the last meeting of the Rose City Park Improvement league Monday evening. It is the desire of the property owners of Rose City Park to procure the grading of the road before the date of the first annual fair of the Country club and Livestock association next fall. The officers of the Livestock association will give their assistance to the movement.

The street railway company will be unable to lay a double track on Sandy road until the road is graded. The railway company is very willing to assist the livestock association in every way possible and the grading of the road will be laid in time for the first big fair if the thoroughfare is properly graded.

The work of getting a driveway for automobiles and carriages to the site of the fair grounds is well under way. The plan is to connect this driveway with the new steel bridge to be built across the river at Albina below the present steel bridge. The new fair grounds will also be used as a Monday evening. The sum yet to be obtained amounts to nearly \$1,500. Mr. Hall will be assisted by H. H. Prouty.

RENEW EFFORTS TO SECURE LIBRARY FUND

Committee Enlists Services of Assistant Secretary of East Side Club.

It is planned to give an entertainment in the Woodmen of the World hall on East Sixth street some time in the near future by which means it is believed a large amount of the necessary money yet to be pledged can be secured. The committee promised to act upon the idea at a later date. It was proposed by J. T. Wilson of Sunnyside.

SELLWOOD NOT READY FOR SEWER

Sellwood will not have a sewer for some time. At a largely attended meeting in Welch's store Tuesday evening it was unanimously voted to postpone indefinitely the construction of a sewer in the district east of East Fifteenth street because of the cost. It was thought by those present that the suburb had not attained that point in its development where a sewer was needed in view of the fact that many homes were still unpaid for and were not even supplied with water. There are a number of streets yet ungraded and it is thought the cost would be so great as to make it inconvenient at this time to a great number of home owners.

Pioneer Dead.
