Ad Club Believes Repetition of Last Year's Feature Is Imperative.

CHILDREN'S ROSE DRILL ASKED FOR

In the minds of a large part of the public, including many business men, the success of the Portland Rose Festival is contingent upon participation by the school children.

Adopt Resolutions. The following resolution introduced by C. N. Black was unanimously adopted:

Whereas, It has become a matter of common rumor and a subject of public comment that the school children of Portland may not participate in the Rose Festival parades on the day assigned to them;

And whereas, The Portland Ad club, though not strictly a public organization, yet in its individual membership is essentially close to most matters of general interest, and again, the vocation of its members is such as to put them in touch with common sentiment, and enables them to closely observe and intelligently comment upon the effect of public occurrences on the popular mind.

Therefore, We believe that we are expressing, not only our own convictions, but the almost unanimous verdict of the thousands who viewed the parades of 1907, that the "Children's day" appealed more to the hearts and sentiment of the people than any other feature of the festival.

The buzz and bravos of the throng at the passing of the rose-decked vehicles and floats was because of the magnificence of the spectacle, and in appreciation of the splendid effort which had made possible the gorgeous pageant of Oregon's wonders.

But the plaudits did not come so surely from the hearts, and eyes were not moistened as on the day of tremendous enthusiasm which greeted the passing of the white-clad, rose-garlanded regiments of Portland's own, their handsome children.

Each child a living, moving rosebud, marvelously typical of the bounding healthfulness of our climate, and every one of them in their joyous step and bright eyes alertly and cheerfully responsive to the spirit of the golden west.

No June sun in any clime ever shone upon so fair a scene; no procession ever graced the streets of Portland so quickly touched the heartstrings and the pride of its people, or so vividly and so beautifully pictured what it means to live in Oregon as when the rose-wreathed brigade of the men and women of tomorrow swept proudly and proudly through crowded avenues of delighted Portland and its thousands of applauding visitors.

Therefore, Be it resolved by the Portland Ad club, that the fame of our children's parade has gone abroad, and that not only to our citizens, but to our visitors would there come a sense of disappointment should the rose bannered march of the children be missed on the 1908 festival day, one of the rarest opportunities be lost for happily spreading the name and fame of Oregon.

We believe that in the festival exercises each and every loyal Portlander should add what he can of effort for the success of the enterprise which means so much to the progress of our city and our state. We urge that the parents and the school board get together and permit in their hearts of the children to have expression. Give us again the inspiration and sentiment of "Children's day" as a stirring prelude to the June days when thousands are to come, and when the rose will be queen. Let us have the children.
