IS QUITE GOOD

Plenty of Fish in River and Cannery Are Ordering Larger Supplies.

Front street features. Wool and mohair arriving. High poultry prices. Eggs are weaker again. Potato business better. Hop sales are excellent. First shad arrive in market. Dressed meats retain demand. Wheat market is weaker. Smelt run is improved.

Salmon Prospects Are Good. There is every evidence at this time that the spring run of salmon in the Columbia and Willamette rivers will be very heavy this season.

Cannermen Expect a Bush Season. Cannermen are making preparations for the record-breaking run of fish when the spring season opens up on the 15th of the month.

High Poultry Prices. Very high prices are ruling in the poultry market along Front street, owing to the scant supplies during the past 10 days.

Eggs Are Weaker. The egg market is weaker today, and the market generally stands around 18c, although once in a while a single egg may be found at a better price.

Potato Business Is Better. There is a somewhat better movement of potatoes to the southwest at this time. Low prices have enabled the local shipping trade to get rid of a portion of the surplus at about growing prices.

Onions are holding firm. The arrival of Japanese onions is reported in this city. Southern markets are better because of the mild weather, which causes the stock to sprout very fast.

Asparagus is more plentiful and prices are lower. Another shipment of hot-house cucumbers from Ontario is reported in by express this morning.

After cutting out several cars of beans which formerly arrived in this market weekly, the trade is deemed to increase the present supplies by one car a week.

Oranges are now being received here in 50-lb. hampers instead of boxes. This mode of shipment is more cheaply handled because of the elimination of box-packing.
