CANADIANS WANT TO PUT DUTY ON LUMBER

Bellingham, Wash., March 6.—A special from Vancouver, British Columbia, says: "In the opinion of H. A. Stone, vice-president of the Vancouver board of trade, much of the stagnation of the lumber trade is due to the fact that

rough lumber is permitted to enter Canada duty free. Believing a great injustice is being done this province by the dominion government, he moved the adoption of resolutions urging the dominion government to give this matter their prompt consideration and to place a duty of \$2 per thousand on rough lumber and 20 cents per thousand on shingles at the earliest possible date.

U'REN'S SPEECH STRIKES FAVOR

Statement 1 Only Cure for Such Corruption as Scott-Bourne Contract.

It is not now a question of "Who struck Billy Patterson?" or of "How old is Ann?" The main point at issue over in South Portland among the leaders of the South Portland Republican club is "Who uncorked the bottle that corked the arguments of W. S. U'Ren?" It is a cinch that some one did it, and President Lillis is looking for that man, the Republican Democrat, Socialist or anarchist. Whatever he be, he will get his if his victims get him.

What is all this about? Ask W. M. Davis, familiarly known as "Pill" because he came from that famous county in Missouri. He does not have to be shown. He knows, and as he talks of the incident he elevates his nose and shivers in his new spring suit. His other clothes have been hung out to air, for Mr. Davis was one of the innocent bystanders, and there were several more.

In plain words, some naughty cut-up let loose a bottle of sulphureted hydrogen, known to every schoolboy as the compound unadulterated quintessence of rotten eggs. In Jones hall last night just as W. S. U'Ren was taking a deep breath for his peroration, and the crowd broke for the exits with a wild disorganized rush. No one will ever know what the perpetrator would have done for Mr. U'Ren himself had he a hasty retreat when the foul wave hit him in the face.

Defines Direct Primary. W. S. U'Ren was the principal speaker at the meeting of the South Portland Republican club last night. He spoke in defense of the primary law and Statement No. 1. T. J. Fording, who said he had not engaged in debate for 10 years, and who proved it by his remarks, took the other side of the question and spent most of the time before the audience waiting for his hearers to laugh at him and urge him to begin to discuss Statement No. 1.

Scott-Bourne Corruption. The speaker called up the Scott-Bourne contract, in which Scott agreed to pay Bourne \$25,000 for Bourne's support in Scott's bid for United States senator in 1903. Mr. U'Ren said that while Scott had filed feeble denial of the contract as printed in the American magazine and Oregon papers, no denial had been heard from Senator Bourne, nor had criminal action been instituted against any of those publishing the story.

The speaker paid tribute to John H. Mitchell, who had himself put the finishing touches upon Statement No. 1. The senator had said when he completed the statement, "That will fix it. No one can get out of supporting the people's choice for United States senator." Whatever else John H. Mitchell did, the speaker contended, he was always loyal to the principle of the popular election of senators.

Legislators go to the legislature to represent the whole people of the state, the speaker argued, and not to represent the Republican party. "I want a Republican in the United States senate," said Mr. U'Ren. "I am a Republican and I want a Republican in the United States senate, but first I am an American citizen, and if the majority of the people of Oregon want to send George E. Chamberlain to the senate I want to see him go there."

The same rule ought to apply to the election of senators as to constables. If the voters do not know enough to vote for United States senators they do not know enough to cast their ballots for constable.

Mr. U'Ren said that the men who were opposing Statement No. 1 had ground axes in the past and he believed that they were grinding axes now. Following Mr. U'Ren a few minutes were taken up by T. J. Fording, after which Mr. U'Ren took the platform to close his debate. He had his opponent faced and the crowd with him. Another statement men in the hall charged that the meeting had been packed with Socialists and Democrats because of the great applause given the Statement No. 1 utterances and arguments of the speaker. It was evident, however, that a large number of the older men were there, which made the game about even. It was a Statement No. 1 meeting from start to finish.

As the guests were feeling before the potent smell of the unseen bottle in the back of the hall, President Lillis withdrew the temper to flee long enough to declare the meeting adjourned until next Thursday night.

Pendleton, Or., March 6.—At a meeting of the council of the city of Pendleton was passed the effect that drugstores in Pendleton will not be allowed to sell alcoholic liquors except in filling written orders from physicians, providing one sale for each prescription.

The penalty will be a fine of from \$10 to \$100 or imprisonment from 6 to 30 days.

Metzger fits glasses for \$1.00. Fast Work on Battleship. (United Press Lined Wire.) Boston, March 6.—A record for speed in the construction of vessels for the United States navy will likely be established in the case of the 20,000-ton battleship North Dakota, which is now building in the Fore River shipyards at Quincy. Though it will only four months since the keel was laid the ship is now nearly 20 per cent finished, and it is expected that it will be ready for launching about the first of October.

Consistent with the size of the ship and the difficult problems involved the progress made in her construction is considered remarkable by the naval experts.
