## ANTI-NOISE CULT THRILLS EUROPE

M. Marcel Provost Quaintly Tells of Mrs. Rice's Success in Vienna.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Paris, March 5.—Mrs. Isaac Rice of New York, who has earned the title of the "Queen of Silence," by reason of the war she has waged against unnecessary noises, was interviewed today in Paris by M. Marcel Provost, the great French essayist and novelist. In describing his interview M. Provost, whose books are among the most popular in French literature, commented interestingly on the crusade against noise which Mrs. Rice is waging in continental cities. He said: "I have met the 'Queen of Silence,' Mrs. Isaac Rice, the powerful and rich Yankee woman, who declared war against noise in all its phases—declared it and waged it with admirable energy and wisdom. Her empire is to embrace all the capitals of the world. 'New York, her native town, is still holding back, she says, but Berlin has capitulated. 'I dare say, by and by, the king of Prussia will send you to jail if you tap with a cane on the sidewalk of Unter den Linden. They have a Mrs. Rice Anti-Noise league in Vienna, and now Paris is listening to the New York society woman.

Met Four Daughters Also. "I met Mrs. Rice in company with her four daughters—fascinating girls between the ages of 14 and 15. The oldest showed me a small volume of verse she had written—lovely verses they seemed to me. The next had the goodness to tell me that she is a sculptress and that some of her Dianas and Cupids are now in Paris. The third paints and does it well, and the fourth performs something equally agreeable. I forget what. But all assured me that they do not play the piano, and never have played it.

"I had the honor to address the Queen of Silence as follows: 'Exalted lady, let me thank you in the name of France for the boon you are about to confer on Paris. Yours is a warfare sublime, for noise is stupid, brutal, inimical to happiness. You are right. Noise must be killed, annihilated. I am delighted with your crusade, but it is not far reaching enough. It doesn't go to the root of the matter. To begin with, the houses of Paris are not as well built as those in New York.

"If a person in a neighboring flat has a cold, he may sneeze as well as cough and sneeze in your room as in his. I live on the fourth floor, but when the entrance floor is scrubbed, I hear every swish and sweep of the mop. The scuffings of the whole tenement, or apartment house seem to quarrel and shout and nag in your own parlor. Worst of all, Mrs. Rice, all the pianos in the block thump and squeak in your apartment, every piano playing a separate tune, of course.
