### Battle of Life Is Forever Against Subtle Attacks of Temptation.

### COMES TO MEET US IN VARIOUS FORMS

### Tempter Is No Respector of Persons, Places or Conditions—Mighty Ones Fall Before Blows as Easily as Lowly Ones.

"The Temptations That Assail Humanity," formed the theme of an address by the Rev. J. H. Black, at St. Francis' church yesterday morning. Father Black dwelt at length upon the necessity for a continual armor and weapons of defense against the various forms in which temptations attack individuals according to conditions and state of life, none being exempt, saying in effect, that voluptuousness, avarice and pride, three particularly insidious forms in which temptation works, may be overcome, respectively, by fasting, liberality and prayer.

### LOSING CHRIST.

Different Matter for Man to Thrust Out Divine Power.

"A Sad State" was the subject of an interesting sermon delivered by Rev. Lester C. Poor, pastor of Sellwood Methodist church, last night. The minister pictured a soul lost to the faith of God and dwelt upon lost opportunities of life. He said in part: "We may let the best things of life slip away from us and not be conscious of our loss until long afterwards. Paul tells the Ephesians, in the second chapter and twelfth verse, that they had lost the great treasure. In the next verse he tells them how their loss had been restored to them. 'Christ things come to them.' Christ has so entered modern life that, in a sense, no man may be said to be 'without Christ.' If you take Christ out of literature you have only a fragment; or out of art, you have a broken statue; or out of music, you have a broken harp. In another sense, however, the man who has rejected Christ from ruling over his life may be said to be 'without Christ.' The church may be lost to us. It may be true that the church is not doing all she ought to do, but she is doing a great work. It is a sad thing to belong to the great churchless world. Blessed it is to be in sympathy and harmony with the great movements to uplift mankind. The Bible may be lost to the center table and in the library, but it may even then become a sealed book. What a great loss the 'covenant of promise' is."

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# GIVES VIEWS ON NEW YORK

### Tetrazzini Tells Friend in Letter She Is Delighted With Public.

(Hearst News by Longest Leased Wire.) London, March 9.—Mme. Tetrazzini's impressions of America are conveyed in an interesting letter she has written to a friend in London. "All things considered," writes the prima donna, "I am delighted with the New York public. It is odious to compare them with the English, but I have my own views on the matter, and these I intend to keep private. They have been very good to me here. I came here with a reputation, and naturally I found it difficult to justify it. It is the same with everybody. When I make my first bow to the audience each night I am always greeted with tremendous applause, and you have no idea what a beneficial effect this has on one. I have an idea the majority of people in New York are Europeans by birth, but it does not take them long to cultivate a good American accent, and they all rapidly develop into Americans—even to their clothes. The people are devoted to good singers. The singer then refers to the curious statement made by some of the newspapers that she can only sing when under the hypnotic influence of her manager, Signor G. Boselli—like a second Trilby. "No serious and intelligent person would believe such a thing," she writes, "but in all seriousness it has been said that I can only sing when hypnotized—magnetized: Is it not ridiculous? Such statements really cannot be the result of anything but a grotesque imagination."

# TO ESTABLISH NEW REPUBLIC

### Derelict Province of Moresnet Chosen as Place of Operation.

(Hearst News by Longest Leased Wire.) Paris, March 9.—An Esperanto republic is the ambitious scheme of Professor Gustave Roy, professor of living languages at the St. Girons college, who is an enthusiast about the new "universal language." His proposal is to convert the derelict province of Moresnet, where the frontiers of Holland, Belgium and Germany meet, into a little independent state inhabited and governed by Esperantists where Esperanto shall be the "native tongue." The present inhabitants—half German, half Belgian—number, in all, about three thousand. The name suggested for this new Utopia is Amikejo, the Esperanto for "friendship." There will be no taxes in Amikejo, the revenue there being derived from subscriptions from Esperantists in all parts of the world, and from a proposed casino to be established there. There will be an Esperanto college, a chamber for the protection of Esperantist interests, an Esperanto theatre, and an Esperanto newspaper. The government will be Republican in form, the president being the principal of the International Esperantist college, who would probably be Professor Gustave Roy himself.

# SPokane County at THE A-Y-P. FAIR

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Spokane, March 9.—Spokane is the first county in the Pacific northwest to arrange for a permanent exhibition building at the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific exposition at Seattle in 1909. The structure is to cost \$5,000 and will contain a display of the natural resources of this county in grain, grasses, minerals, fruits and timber. The exhibit is to be installed by M. J. Wessels, who has attended every exposition of consequence in the United States, including the centennial at Philadelphia in 1876.
