about 25 passengers. She makes the run from the mouth of the Columbia to Tillamook in about 15 hours and can cover the distance from Astoria to Portland in about 10 hours. It took her 11 hours Saturdaw coming up the river but the extra hour was lost in a fog encountered on the Columbia.
