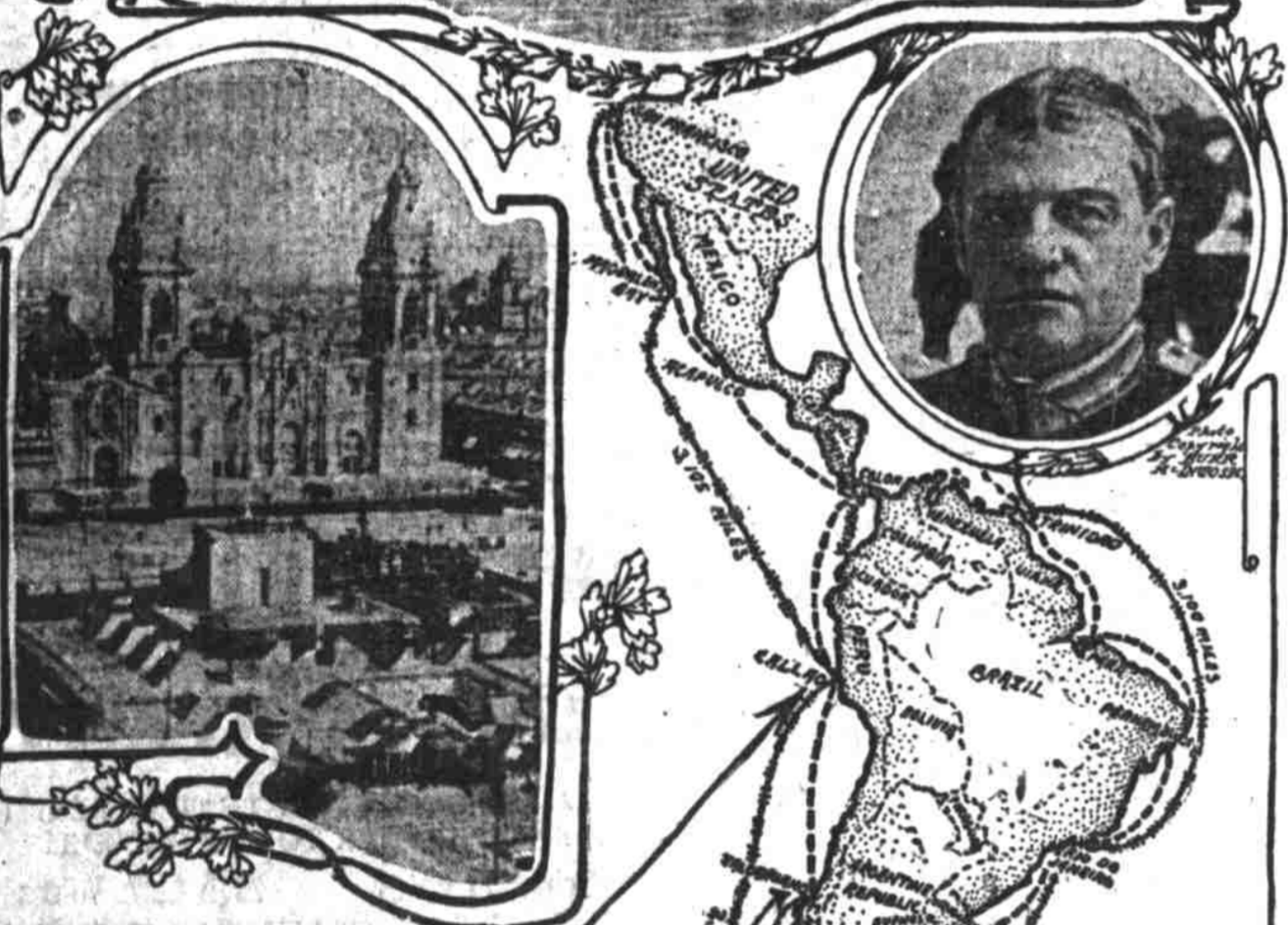
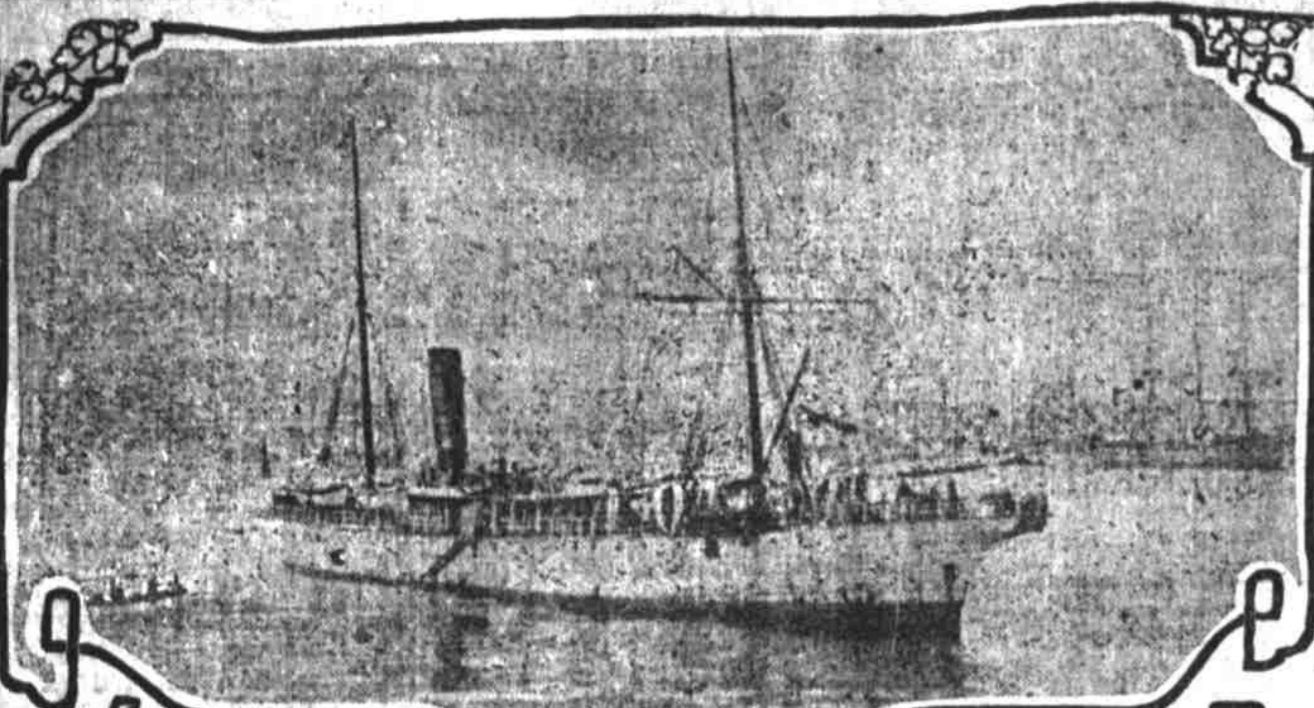


JOURNAL'S WORK TO HAVE CRUISER SQUADRON VISIT CITY SUCCESSFUL

The Journal, as announced in the issue of Monday, has succeeded in getting into line enough influence at the capital to secure promises that part of the cruiser squadron will be here during the Ross Carnival.

News was received from Washington this morning in effect that the ships would be stationed here for a week. TAX ORDINANCE IS EFFECTIVE

City Attorney Rules New Law Cannot be Nullified by Referendum.

City Attorney John Kavanaugh has ruled that the vehicle tax ordinance is in effect; that it cannot be nullified by the referendum, and can only be repealed by the council or by the electors at the next city election. This is the ordinance which was passed over Mayor Lane's veto February 24 and which Councilman Kellaher has started referendum petitions against.

Councilman Kellaher says that he will not pay any attention to the city attorney's opinion, holding that Judge Cleland held to the opposite side in a decision rendered the other day. Mr. Kellaher says that he will go ahead with the referendum petition. City Attorney Kavanaugh's opinion follows:

"Under the amendment and the constitutional provision no act can take effect until 90 days after the adjournment of the legislature, except the class of emergency acts enumerated in the amendment. Therefore no law on which a referendum can be demanded can take effect during the time in which a referendum petition can be filed, but this first suspension arises from the provisions of section 28, article IV, rather than from the provisions of the amendment because the law could not take effect for 90 days after the adjournment of the legislature, even if a referendum petition were not filed."

"The referendum petition, however, will suspend the operation of the statute until the next general election. But in such case the referendum petition is interposed before the law takes effect. The filing of a referendum petition after the statute becomes operative would have no legal effect. The same rule applies to municipal ordinances. What is the purpose of the referendum? It is to determine by vote of the electors, whether a measure that is not in effect shall become a law. An existing law, state or municipal, cannot be repealed by the referendum. It can only be abrogated by repeal. A repeal of this ordinance might be secured by initiative petition, or the council may repeat it by ordinance. If an existing ordinance could be suspended pending the filing of a referendum petition, or from the filing of such petition until the next city election, such suspension would result in great inconvenience."

"This ordinance in its terms provides a new schedule of licenses, and repeals the former ordinance. The former ordinance is repealed and this ordinance is in effect. If such power of suspension exists, it might be exercised at any time prior to 60 days before the next election. Other ordinances might be repealed in this manner, thus creating the cost of a public improvement could be held in abeyance. A referendum might be demanded upon appropriation ordinances after they had passed the council and had been approved by the mayor. This would lead to great confusion, and such a situation was certainly not contemplated by the framers of the constitutional amendment."

"It was never intended that a law or ordinance, once in force, could be defeated by the referendum. That there is no provision in our law for the suspension of an ordinance is one of the defects of our present system. Others will no doubt develop in the course of time. It can be remedied by an appropriate provision in the ordinance itself, by a charter amendment adopted by the electors, or by another constitutional amendment. The legislature is powerless to afford relief under the present constitution. It is unfortunate that this defect was not discovered and provided for, but in the present situation the law must be applied as it exists."

Streeter in 40, E. P. McDonald in 51, W. A. Charles in 18 and W. J. Beutelspacher in 34. New Democratic entries are S. W. Anderson in 54, T. Peery in 77 and C. A. Ambrose in 56.

SOLD WARRANTS; NOW SEEKS THEIR RETURN

E. D. Truman, an employe of the city treasury department, sold his salary warrants for January and February to Ashby & Rumell, salary brokers, but has since notified the city treasurer not to cash them and claims the warrants himself. The city treasurer being thus between two fires, the city attorney has brought suit in the circuit court in the name of the city against Truman and the brokers as well, asking the court to decide to whom the money on the warrants should be paid.

The question is apparently the old question involved in buying warrants. On one side the transaction is looked upon as a sale of the warrant, but from another point it looks like the charging of an interest on a loan. In this case, however, there may be some points to make it vary from the usual brokerage transaction.

WELLSLEY NOW HELD IN COUNTY PRISON

Important Witness for Government Transferred from Hospital.

George Wellsley, who has been sick in the Good Samaritan hospital and for whom an important witness warrant was issued by Judge Wolverson in the United States court, was transferred yesterday afternoon to the county jail from the hospital to the county jail as a witness in the case of the government against Wellsley and three others who are charged with using the mails to defraud. Wellsley formerly roomed with the gang his confederates, it is charged, had hundreds of old defunct state bank notes sent to Portland from Chicago and then passed them off for good money. They cannot be tried for counterfeiting so the government officials are to make an endeavor to convict them of using the mails for illegitimate purposes.
