

WINNING TIMBERS FOR ANTIPODES

Two Steamers Chartered to Carry Material from Local Mills.

INVERKIP AND ELSA ON EN ROUTE LIST

Bowring & Co. Charter the British Steamer and American Trading Company Closes Negotiations on Norwegian Freighter Soon Due.

Portland lumber manufacturers have captured orders for nearly 6,000,000 feet of lumber of Australia this week and two large tramp steamers were chartered yesterday to carry the material away. They are the British steamer Inverkip and the Norwegian steamer Elsa.

The Inverkip was chartered by Bowring & Co. to load for Port Pirie, the distributing port of timber for the Australian mines. She will carry about 2,500,000 feet. The Elsa was chartered to the American Trading Company to load for Melbourne or Sydney and she will carry away 2,500,000 feet. She is now at Guaymas, Mexico.

This is one of the largest lots of lumber disposed of here at one time for several weeks and goes to illustrate that the low prices are attracting foreign buyers.

With the Inverkip and Elsa coming here in addition to the large steamer Needles, chartered some time ago, the Russian bark Albyn, the British ship Kelburn and others, Portland will probably export more lumber in April than has been done for a long time in any one month.

The British steamer Strathgyle is under charter to come here to load the steamer Needles, mentioned above, is the largest craft en route. She will get away with close to 4,000,000 feet. She too is under charter to Bowring & Co.

BOAT WILL HAVE SPEED.

Large Gasoline Craft to be Operated on Upper Columbia. (Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Kennewick, Wash., March 11.—Lundy & Matson of this city have closed a contract for the fastest gasoline boat on the upper Columbia river business to run between this city and Priest Rapids, 40 miles, making the round trip in one day.

The boat will be brought up the Columbia to the portage road, where she will be lifted out, taken above Celilo falls and placed in the river again and run up the river to Kennewick. The contract calls for the completion of the boat within 60 days. At present there are two boats plying on the river, the Mountain Gem and the W. R. Todd, but these are unable to handle the rapidly increasing business.

The steam schooner F. S. Loop left for San Francisco last night with 410,000 feet of lumber. She will stop at Tongue Point for a deckload. The steamer Washington left for San Francisco today from Linton. She carries lumber and passengers. The schooner King Cyrus began loading lumber today at Prescott for San Diego. She arrived yesterday. John F. Bon has been appointed stenographer and typewriter in the office of the United States immigration inspector. The position is a new one recommended by Chief Inspector Barbour.

STOP SALE OF THROUGH TICKETS

Commission Rules Against Routing from Tacoma East Via Portland.

As the result of a recent ruling of the Interstate Commerce Commission, the O. R. & N. will in all probability discontinue its sale of through tickets from Tacoma to the east via Portland. Heretofore this has been done, the O. R. & N. absorbing the local rate of \$4.35. This will mean the discontinuance of agencies on Puget sound. The ruling is said to have come about in response to the new tariffs of the Union Pacific, Milwaukee and other roads selling through tickets to Portland only, but its exact provisions are still unknown to O. R. & N. officials here. They expect to get the desired detailed information soon, when it will be definitely settled whether or not to withdraw the agency in Tacoma. It is, however, said here that there is a question whether the new order will affect westbound traffic, which is the bigger slice of the transcontinental business. To a certain extent the new order means that the O. R. & N. is cut off from passenger business between Puget sound and the east via Portland until the proposed Harriman branch through this city and Tacoma materializes. In the past the rate from Tacoma to points east has been the same over the northern lines and the Harriman lines via Portland, although no traffic arrangement has been made between the Hill lines and the O. R. & N. To enable the Harriman line to quote a through rate equal to that of the Hill lines, it simply absorbed the local rate between Portland and Tacoma, which privilege has now been denied them by the Interstate Commerce Commission. The new order will not affect the traffic arrangements between the Hill lines and the Southern Pacific company.

VOTERS HUSTLE TO PUT NAMES ON REGISTER

Five Hundred and Two "Over 21" Affix Family Title on Books.

Yesterday was one of the record days in registration at the office of the county clerk, 502 names being added to the rolls. There are just four weeks of registration left, and if an average of 500 per day is maintained on the home stretch the total registration will be 30,000. As the office of the county clerk is kept open each evening until 9 o'clock and the candidates are being stimulated to greater effort as the day for the primaries comes nearer, it is possible that the 500 figure may be exceeded and the grand total boosted beyond the 30,000 mark. Of those thus far registered, 14,561 are Republicans, 3,787 are Democrats and 933 have signed as Independents, Prohibitionists or Socialists. Including yesterday's figures the total is 18,681.
