Council Unable to Resist Entreaty to Transfer License of Notorious Pullman—Every Promise of Latter Broken.

VOTE ON LICENSE TRANSFER

The city council almost—but not quite—revoked the liquor license supposed to belong to P. C. O'Mara of the Pullman cafe, 286 Alder street, and instead, allowed a transfer of the license from C. A. Tuck to O'Mara after one of the closest votes seen in the council for several months. With the transfer of the license to O'Mara, the council is expected to pass out of its deliberations history for the next six weeks, when another transfer of the license will be asked to place the saloon in the new Commercial club building.

Exceeding the final vote a warm debate took place which ended as all debates on this place have ended. The council gave the saloonmen what they asked for.

Investigation a Farce.

Mr. Menefee roared the liquor license committee in round terms, saying that the investigation had been a farce, that the transfer from John Conrad to C. A. Tuck had been a fake pure and simple and that he had no faith in the present transfer.

"Why doesn't the committee give us a report on its investigations?" he asked. "What I would like to have is a report of their findings. I think that when a committee makes a long investigation it should give a report to the council. The transfer from Conrad to Tuck was a fake pure and simple. This is a case of knowledge, as in that case soon after the fake transfer was made Conrad and Tuck quarreled and Tuck left the city. Conrad and Tuck were picked up. I do not like this way of doing and ask the committee to examine it and report to the council."

Menefee's words came like a bombshell to the rest of the councilmen because it was thought that the granting of the license had been a cut and dried affair. When the matter came up in the council last Monday, Councilmen Driscoll and Dunning assured the council that O'Mara had made a bonafide purchase, that Conrad would have nothing to do with the place and that the Pullman saloon would not be a part of the past. These councilmen assured the rest of the committee that as soon as the saloon is installed in the Commercial club building the license would be transferred to that place and the Pullman would be put out of business.

Because of these assurances Councilmen Cotel, Willis, Wallace and Rush signed the transfer although several of them are known to be opposed to Conrad. They said they signed the transfer solely for the purpose that the license be kept alive. Inasmuch as no saloon would be granted in Portland, each one revoked means a loss of \$200 a year to the city. The councilmen signed the transfer upon the condition that the license be transferred again in a new place within a short time.

BAUER COMES FRESH FROM LONDON SEASON

WARDEN BAKER TRY TO BUTCHER MAKES CHARGES PACKING HOUSE

Game Official Says Convictions Rare When Guilty Ones Are Arrested.

Portland sportsmen are flayed in a letter bristling with caustic sentences, which State Game and Fish Warden J. W. Baker has written Will Lipman, one of the best known sportsmen in Oregon. Baker's ire was aroused by an article written by Lipman which reflected upon the activity of game wardens and characterized them as worthless.

Lipman charged that game birds could be bought in Portland restaurants in violation of the law. He also advocated a central organization of state sportsmen to urge legislation and to create a more friendly feeling between sportsman and farmer, and the creating of a game commission to enforce the laws.

In reply to Mr. Lipman Baker says: "Mr. Will Lipman—Dear Sir: In the Oregon Journal of February 23 you charge that game wardens are worthless. That charge is maliciously false, and you know it. If, as you say, China pheasants could be had at hotels and restaurants in Portland during the last season, why did you not report the fact to Game Wardens Beal, Green or Mack? Any one of them would have investigated the case at once."

"With the so-called sportsmen like yourself, and the courts as well as the district attorneys, against the enforcement of the game laws, it is not surprising that a game warden to accomplish anything in the way of protecting game? Let me refer you to a case. Parties in Portland and Gaston last year during the closed season were caught violating the game law, and the district attorney of Tillamook county refused to take any action in the case.

Dr. Cotel Makes Heated Objection to Industry in South Portland.

The plan to put through the ordinance to open the city to slaughter-houses in order to secure the erection of the Schwartzschild & Sulzburger plant in South Portland received a severe jolt at the hands of Councilman Cotel at yesterday's council meeting and action was deferred by referring the measure to the committee on health and police.

That the measure is confidently expected, but unless the wrath of Dr. Cotel can be appeased he threatens to use the referendum against the proposition.

Makes Thunderous Speech.

Councilman Cotel made the longest speech since he has been in the council against the slaughter-house measure yesterday afternoon and his cholera was not appeased by the good-natured laughter that met some of his statements. He started out by saying that he did not want the slaughter-house in the south end of Portland because he lived there, and then proceeded to tell the members what he thought of the ordinance specifically and generally. He did not mince matters and called the present plan "this stinking place," and other equally forceful terms, ending by calling the move a "damnable outrage."
