

RUSSIAN SAILER MAKES FINE RUN

Bark Albany Comes From Callao, Peru, in Even Forty Days.

BELIEVED TO BE RECORD VOYAGE

Arrives Under Charter to Carry Lumber to South Africa—Cement Laden French Bark and Britisher in Ballast Also Reach Columbia.

What is believed to be the record voyage from Callao, Peru, to the Columbia river was completed last night when the Russian bark Albany came into the bay and dropped anchor off Astoria.

The Albany comes in ballast under charter to the Pacific Export Lumber company to carry a cargo of lumber to South Africa. She is the first of the continent for some time and the cargo is there for several months. South Africa having bought little lumber here of late for some reason or other.

Two other windjammers reached the river last night. The British ship Clan Buchanan from Santa Rosalia, and the French bark Ernest Legouve, from London.

ASTORIA MARINE NEWS.

New Boats Completed and Old Ones Transferred.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Astoria, Or., March 12.—A bill of sale was filed in the custom-house this morning whereby the Callander Navigation company transfers the steamer Wagona to W. E. Hull, John Johnson and Oscar Olson for the sum of \$9,000.

The North Shore Transportation company held a meeting of the stockholders last evening and decided to increase its capital stock from \$100,000 to \$400,000.

ONLY FOUR SURVIVORS.

Mate of American Ship Thillie E. Starbuck in New York.

New York, March 12.—How he spent 45 days in an open boat and several occasions is the subject of a thrilling story that William Kuhlman, second mate of the American ship Thillie E. Starbuck, is relating today.

Only four of the 35 men who left New York on the Starbuck, April 6, live to tell the awful story of the wrecking of the boat. Kuhlman, who has arrived here, says that when the Starbuck was wrecked in the Antarctic ocean 20 men

were drowned after the lifeboat was smashed, that Captain William Wills blew his brains out, the cook was killed on deck and two sailors in the second boat were drowned. Kuhlman declares he will go to sea again, in spite of his thrilling experience, but before going so he will visit his parents in California.

OFF FOR UNITED KINGDOM. British Bark Crown of Germany Carries Big Cargo.

The British Bark Crown of Germany cleared yesterday afternoon for Europe with 14,145 bushels of wheat, valued at \$125,000, and left down the river. The next vessel to clear from here with wheat will be the British steamer Gryfvalde, which is finishing her cargo today at Oceanic dock. The Gryfvalde goes to Hongkong.

The Norwegian steamer Tricolor will finish loading lumber at the mills of the Eastern & Western Lumber company tomorrow or Saturday. It will be about a month before the American bark Acme completes her cargo of lumber at the mills of the Portland Lumber company.
