

MAJORITY FIGHTS SHY OF NEW THEORY OF PEOPLE'S RIGHT TO RULE ADAM AND EVE

Out of 50 Legislative Candidates Only Few Have Pledged Themselves to Really Represent People—Balance Expect to Override Senatorial Wishes of the Voters.

With 15 days remaining in which to file declarations of intention of candidacy there are now approximately 50 legislative candidates in the state who have come out openly and said they intend to make an effort to become members of the legislature.

So far throughout all the registration the majority of the applicants have passed up the binding pledges of Statement No. 1, leaving the matter in their own hands of whether or not they will be instructed by the popular vote on the United States senatorship in June. Others have modified the statement, agreeing to vote for the Republican choice. There are scattering numbers who have pledged themselves to Statement No. 1 and the principles of the primary law.

Within the next few days it is expected that the county clerks throughout the state will be kept busy filing the declarations of the candidates who have delayed until the last days of the time limit before coming out into the open field.

State Men Unpledged.

In Baker county Moore, a member of the last session, is out as a candidate for reelection to the lower house. He takes no pledge. Henry McKinney is also after the nomination from the same county and promises to support the public interest in casting his vote for senator.

Walter C. Belt of Portland, is a candidate for joint representative from Clackamas and Multnomah counties. He stands pledged to Statement No. 1 and will make a vigorous campaign throughout the two counties. Opposed to him is Clinton N. McArthur, also of Portland. McArthur is a member of the machine slate put out in Portland yesterday, and says he will vote for the people's choice for senator, provided that choice be a Republican. He was a candidate for the office two years ago but was defeated by a substantial majority by J. U. Campbell of Oregon City.

In Clackamas county proper, George W. Dixon of Canby, and F. M. Gill of Estacada, are both seeking the nomination for representative from that county. Both men stand pledged to Statement No. 1 and promise to work hard for the triumph of the principles of the primary law.

E. W. Jensen and I. N. Muncy have announced their aspirations to serve in the lower house from Coos and Curry counties. Neither of the men have outlined their attitudes in regard to Statement No. 1 or the contrary.

G. Springer of Clatsop announced himself as a candidate for the Democratic nomination for joint senator from Crook, Klamath and Grant counties. He has taken Statement No. 1.

Dr. U. C. Coe has announced himself as a candidate for joint representative from Klamath, Lake and Grant counties. He has taken no stand regarding Statement No. 1.

In Douglas county Commodore S. Jackson, a member of the house at the last session, is out for senator at the coming session. He is opposed by Albert Abraham, who is also unpledged. E. R. Applegate seeks the nomination for representative. He has taken no pledge. He is opposed by George Jones

Jr., who has pledged himself to Statement No. 1.

Jay Bowerman of Condon, a senator at the last session, has announced his candidacy for joint senator from Gilliam, Sherman and Wheeler counties. He has taken no pledge.

C. W. Parrish is out for senator from Grant county and has taken no pledge on the senatorship.

J. L. Sims has announced his candidacy for joint senator from Baker, Harney and Malheur counties. He has taken no pledge.

Crook, Klamath and Lake counties have three candidates for the office of joint senator. They are George H. Merriam, L. F. Willis and Harry L. Holcomb. Neither of the three candidates has taken any pledge regarding the senatorship.

H. A. Brantain is out for the position of joint representative from Crook, Grant, Klamath and Lake counties. He has taken no pledge.

In Marion county, Hal D. Patton of Salem and Henry J. Miller of Aurora are both out for representative, and both have taken the Statement No. 1 pledge.

T. J. Mahoney of Ione has announced his candidacy for joint representative from Morrow and Umatilla counties. He has pledged himself to vote for the Republican choice for United States senator.

In Polk county, E. F. Jones, a member of the last house, is out for reelection on a Statement No. 1 platform.

C. A. Barrett of Umatilla county, and a member at the last session, is after reelection to the house on a Statement No. 1 platform.

Colon R. Eberhard has announced his candidacy for joint representative from Union and Willowa counties. He is running on a Statement No. 1 platform.

In Wasco county Daniel J. Cooper and Henry L. Kuch are after the senatorship. The first has subscribed to a Republican choice pledge while the latter is unpledged. S. W. Stark is after the nomination for representative from the same county.

In Washington county W. K. Newell, a member of the house at the last session, is seeking reelection. He has taken the Republican choice pledge. W. D. Wood is running for the senate on an unpledged platform.

Machine Men All Groomed.

In Multnomah county the following men have come out for the different legislative offices: For the senate, C. W. Hodson, J. C. Bayer, John B. Coffey, John Driscoll, Sig. Sicel. For the house, Robert S. Farrell, N. D. Beutgen, Joseph B. Beveridge, Frank Bolland, L. E. Crouch, George W. Holcomb, Louis Kuehn, Knasper K. Kubli, Dave B. Mackie, George W. McMillan, Frank J. Richardson, L. A. Harlow and A. A. Anderson.

They have taken the following pledges: "We agree to vote for the people's choice for United States senator, provided he is a Republican."

In addition to the machine slate J. C. Bryant, a Statement No. 1 man, Harry E. Northup, M. J. MacMahon, Charles J. McDonald, Statement No. 1, and Robert R. Hunter, are announced candidates for the house. Dr. Emmett Drake and Elmer B. Colwell are candidates for the senate. Both have taken the Republican voters' choice.

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Delinnah, Adam's First Wife, Regarded as Founder of the Negro Race.

Chattanooga, Tenn., March 12.—New and startling doctrines concerning the creation of man are being taught by Randolph Miller through the editorial columns of the Chattanooga Weekly Blade, one of the few negro newspapers of the south. While the adherent of the biblical version of the creation and the student of anthropology will scoff at Editor Miller's theories, they have created a stir of satisfaction among his colored constituency.

The reason thereof is plain; the editor of the Blade, in a manner characteristic of negro journalism in the south "as it is writ," is asserting that Delinnah, Adam had a dark-skinned wife, Delinnah by name, before Eve appeared on the scene, and that she negro descended from this union. This reputed theory of genesis is making the ebony-hued readers of the Blade swell with pride, and there is urgent demand for additional copies of the paper containing this learned discussion of "the two great races of the world."

Before enlightening the public as to the origin of man and shattering the monogenetic theory, Editor Miller has been directing questions to "big elderly clock preachers" and others who might feel kindly disposed to answer them.

"These posers were too much for those who had engaged, he announced, that 'the time being about up, we'll set about to answer them.'"

"It will be remembered," he says, "we asked them to answer our questions when he went to the jungles of Africa, where did he go from? We'll answer this by saying he was created in the Garden of the East, 13 furlongs east of where Adam and Eve were, which is about eight English miles, and it was from there he went to the jungles of Africa by pursuit of Adam and Eve."

According to the Milleronian theory, Cain's attention to the daughter of Delinnah, the mother of the negro race, contributed to the growing of the negro family, so Delinnah and her daughter left for Africa. But Cain, in less than a week, was at her side in the jungles, and the negro race was perpetuated.

Eve Not Adam's First Wife.

"It will be remembered," Editor Miller exclaimed, "we asked, 'Was Eve Adam's first wife?' and ask you to answer it. We know what your answer would be, but we would like to hear your answer. It would simply be what it has always been, and that is 'Yes.' But we say she was not Adam's first wife. She was created when he was already married to Delinnah, and it came to a point where Adam and her could no longer agree, and on this point they separated. Eve started for the jungles of Africa, but took a notion we would Adam boasted to her he (Adam) was created in the image of God, which meant master, of course. Delinnah would not agree to this, and contended that she was created as well as he was, and would not be subject to him. She was a better than she was, and thus they separated."

"Now we will ask another question. Where did she go? Answer, please. If you don't well have to answer. Do you remember we asked, 'Why did Cain kill his brother Abel?' We did, and told you if you couldn't answer, we would give you a girl for which his father Adam fell out with him, and when Cain would come home and his father Adam would get after him about it, Cain would get back at the old man, and finally the old man became afraid of Cain and got Abel to pluck what he could out of Cain and tell him (the old man) all he had learned. This led up to Cain killing Abel."

A Typical Editorial.

Besides the discussion of the origin of the races, there are other things of interest in the columns of this negro paper. One editorial, which is in line with the desire of the negro to be treated as something better than a servant, is headed:

"He Must Have Been Roasted Until He Was Cooked as Well Done as a Well-Roasted Irish Potato," and is as follows:

"It was seen in an article of the Nashville Banner some days ago, where the Banner had roasted a policeman for clubbing a colored man unmercifully without the least provocation for doing so, as the Banner has it. We don't remember to ever seeing an article written by any southern newspaper giving a white man so much down the country about mistreating a colored man. It is said the Banner man has been working at the Banner office for 25 or 26 years. This is one thing the southern white man will do, and that is he'll cuss and fight his

Some Reading Notices.

Editor Miller is also reporter, type-setter and advertising solicitor for his paper. His confessed "peculiar way of thinking" is illustrated by three gems of "free reading."

"William Naley is still driving pegs at his shoe shop in the Wilcox block on East 13th street. His mouth does not get puckered with tasks like it used to, but he drives pegs just the same."

"We were also at 537 Broad street, this city, where we had dropped in to see how Mr. William Walker, who has run a family grocery store at this place for several years, to see how he was getting along. We are prepared to say we found him still doing business at the same old stand, and mean he is doing a land office business at that in the way of selling goods at this place."

"Dr. W. L. Douglas, a well-known citizen and minister of our town, who has been a student under Dr. W. H. Stephens of our city for the last three or four years, has stood a very rigid examination and has gotten his diploma in medical practical sense to see what there is in it. We met the doctor in his rig or buggy the other day, and thought to ourselves, 'Well, he is fixed up to get his patients at once.' But the doctor has a pair of very long legs; what would he care if he had no buggy?"

SEEK SOIL SURVEY OF KLAMATH PROJECT

COMMISSION ALLOWED TO CRUISE TIMBER

REINTERRED AFTER TWENTY-FOUR YEARS

STORAGE RESERVOIR IS BEING FILLED

Hermiston, Or., March 12.—Water is now dashing from the feed canal of the Umatilla project into the storage reservoir. The canal is carrying about 100 feet per second which amounts to approximately 200-acre feet per day. This is about the amount the service expects to maintain until the first of June, after which the water in the project is rapidly being accomplished. Besides the work on the dam a force of men under Engineer J. M. Griffin have completed two large structures of concrete under the O. R. & N. track on the Astoria and Columbia lines, and various concrete turnouts from the main distribution canals. Among them are a series of concrete drops which aid in distribution. It is now certain that water can be furnished to those wishing it by April 1, and in case the settlers need it before that time, it may be possible to furnish it.
