The Central W. C. T. U. held its usual meeting Wednesday afternoon. After the opening exercises by Mrs. Pflizer, Mrs. Hollinshead, national superintendent of unfermented wine, told of the enthusiasm in Alabama during the first time in the history of the world of a trip through the country. Mrs. Harriet Moorehouse spoke of "Thrift," telling of the school savings banks which are being organized in our country and elsewhere. Great good is being accomplished through this department of the work of these banks in the United States. She read a letter from Spokane. A jury in Judge O'Day's department of the circuit court yesterday decided that L. Groobman is not entitled to financial recompense for his arrest on the charge of malicious destruction of property and subsequent confinement among the hoboes and vagrants at the city jail. He had deposited money for \$1,050 damages, but the defendant showed that he had consulted an attorney before swearing to the complaint. The jury found that he had probable cause for believing Groobman guilty was submitted, although the charge was dropped when heard in the municipal court.

David Lamora was convicted on a statutory charge by a jury in Judge Brombaugh's department of the circuit court last night after a trial lasting all day. Mrs. Frances Myers, the correspondent, took the stand in Lamora's behalf. A peculiar feature of the case was the fact that the case was tried by two of the same attorneys who faced each other in the same case at each court meeting until something was submitted, although the charge was dropped when heard in the municipal court.

Members of the Mount Taber Improvement association, the Center Addition Push club, the St. Stephens Improvement club and the Montaville Improvement club have petitioned the city council for adequate fire protection. The petitioners state that they have the protection and are entitled to it from the city because they have been paying city taxes for three years and because the water supply is sufficient to make a department feasible. They want a fire engine and a combination hose and chemical engine.

The union Lenten service of all the Episcopal churches was held last night at Trinity church. The union service will be repeated each Wednesday night. Next Wednesday the meeting will be at St. David's, the next at St. Mark's, the next at the Church of the Good Shepherd, and the next week at St. Stephen's. The Lenten services at Trinity are as follows: Communion every Wednesday morning at 10, litany every Friday morning at 10, and evening prayers every afternoon except Saturday at 5 o'clock.

For the past several council meetings Councilman Vaughn has asked that the ordinance relating to streetcar fenders be taken from the table and acted upon. He stated several weeks ago he would call upon the members to take up the measure at each council meeting until something is done with it. Yesterday was no exception to his rule and he received the usual second from Councilman Hays. The motion was lost, however, and the ordinance will continue to recline upon the table until it dies a long and lingering death.
