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ELECTRIC LOOP TO TOUCH PENDLETON
Hopes High That Walla Walla Freewater Line May Make Semi-circle Around Umatilla.

Pendleton, Or., March 13.—Visions of an electric line running into this city are raised by the sending of a crew to survey an extension of the Walla Walla Traction company's electric line from Freewater toward Weston. A crew of five men is now at work on the survey near the Watts ranch, half way between Freewater and the present terminus of the line, and Weston. Officials of the company who were here to inspect the city and on to Hermiston and Umatilla in a short time, it is declared.

A telegram was received by Professor Young of the High school here that a member of the debating team of the Baker City High school was suffering with tonsillitis and that the debate would not take place until Friday, March 20. The question to be argued March 20 will be the same that The Dalles team has debated with the Hood River High school team and with the team of Wallowa county High school and has won on both occasions.
