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INDIANAPOLIS SAYS COL DRUHOT IS PROP

Fans Joyful Over Signing of Crack Pitcher and Predict Success.

Here is the sentiment of the Indianapolis Star over the signing of Colly Druhota, the Portland boy, by the Indianapolis baseball team.

"Another prop was put under the pitching staff of the Browns yesterday when Manager Charles Carr signed C. H. Druhota, a southpaw, who two years ago was with the Cincinnati and St. Louis National league clubs. Transportation has been forwarded to Druhota and he will report here Sunday to accompany the squad to French Jack Carr said that Druhota was in good condition and would be able to deliver the goods for the local club, he thought.

"I did not even know Carr was after this fellow," Watkins said last night. "I sent him transportation as soon as I got word that he had been signed, and expect him Sunday. His record is a 10-10. He's a crack pitcher and he ought to help us. An effective southpaw will be a big help to the team."

This addition makes the list of veteran pitchers in the fold a big one. Besides Druhota, there are Elliott, Slagle and Eubanks. There are one or two more veterans to be secured, and they will make the youngsters hustle for their positions.

GANS-ATELL BOUT NOW DECLARED OFF

Joe Tied Up in Baltimore and Bat Nelson Will Substitute.

(United Press Leased Wire.) San Francisco, March 16.—There are hundreds of disappointed sports in and around San Francisco because of the announcement that the Gans-Atell fight scheduled for March 31, has been declared off. The two clever ring generals were to have fought a 16-round contest.

The match was off when Gans sent word to San Francisco yesterday that he would be unable to come west on account of legal matters that required his attention in Baltimore.

It has already been agreed by the promoters of the fight that Batting Nelson is acceptable as a substitute. He will take Gans' place in the ring unless there is another hitch. The men will fight at 132 pounds, weighing in at 8 o'clock.

DEATH AT WARREN OF GEORGE W. BAKER

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) St. Helena, Or., March 16.—George W. Baker, who died at his home at Warren, Friday, was born in Bedford county, Pennsylvania, February 10, 1821. He removed in early childhood to Mineral Springs, Virginia, where he lived until manhood, and was married in 1846. He lived in Virginia, Kansas and Iowa, and during the course of his life was a veteran of the civil war, having served 24 years with the Twenty-fifth Iowa volunteers. A widow and several children survive him.
