

## EVERY GRAFTER WILL BE OUSTED

Police Commissioners of San Francisco Will "Suspend Force if Necessary."

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)  
San Francisco, March 16.—Chief of Police Biggy has suspended two members of the police force who were detailed to duty on the "Barbary Coast." Biggy cleverly trapped the patrolmen, who are alleged to have been grafting off the unfortunates of the district. Other dismissals from the force are expected.

While it may not be possible under the decision of the state supreme court to reach the patrolman with convictions for extortion it was said this morning by members of the police commission that the evidence gathered against suspected patrolmen by Biggy will be followed unless he is able to show every man guilty of grafting is removed from the force. The commission will use the city charter laws to clean out all men who prey off women and their consorts in the "coast" district.

"If we have to discharge every man on the force we will teach the offenders a lesson they will never forget," said a commissioner this morning. "If we find an officer derelict in his duty or using coercion we will suspend him in a moment and he can bring his civil service test into court."

Great Missionary Campaign.

New York, March 16.—Reports received at the headquarters of the national Presbyterian board of home missions in this city tend to show that the board's plan for a one-day whirlwind publicity campaign in the cause of the church and its missionary work has met with gratifying success. This was the date fixed for the simultaneous rallies in cities throughout the country. According to the reports received the plan was carried out in Chicago, Cleveland, Albany, Buffalo, Detroit, Peoria, Baltimore, Cincinnati, Columbus and a number of other cities.

The meetings were addressed by eminent Presbyterian leaders, among them being the Rev. William Henry Roberts, D. D., moderator of the general assembly; Rev. Charles L. Thompson, D. D., secretary of the board of home missions; Rev. Charles Stehle, superintendent of the department of church and labor, and the Rev. Thomas Clinton Moffet, specialist on United States Indian problems. Similar programs were carried out at each of the meetings and modern methods of advertising were employed to attract public attention to the missionary work. The discussions and addresses dealt with the social, the economic, the religious and the general national problems confronting the church in the United States.
