NEGRO IN PEONAGE

Rescued by Faithful Colored Strangers From Servitude, Starvation and Chains—His Master a Reservation Indian.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Tekoa, Wash., March 17.—A sensation was caused yesterday by a report from the reservation that a negro who was working for Louis Antelope, a well-to-do Indian, was forced to labor under threats of severe punishment and with only half enough to eat. Two negroes who have made this town their home for some time took it upon themselves to liberate the negro and hired three fast saddle horses, which they took to Louis Antelope's farm and there they found that the negro had been kept chained at night to keep him from running away. The Indians had the negro so badly frightened that he at first refused to take the advice of his friends to take the fastest horse of the three and fly to freedom. After much persuasion he took the horse and fled, arriving here last night, with the Indians in hot pursuit.

SCAYS ROOSEVELT IS THIRD TERMER

Ben Tillman Accuses President of Seeking Truce With Wealthy.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Washington, March 17.—Failing in his bold and unblushing attempt to force the people of the United States to permit him to dictate his own successor to the presidential chair, President Roosevelt is seeking to compel his own reelection, was the charge hurled at the president today by Senator Benjamin Tillman, in another fiery denunciation of the chief executive, made in the senate today by the South Carolinian. He also charged the president with planning a truce with the "malefactors of great wealth."

RATS CHEW UP PAIR OF 'GATORS

Veracious Tale of Voracious Rodents and Unfortunate Saurians.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Tacoma, Wash., March 17.—Voracious rats have eaten up two good-sized alligators kept at Point Defiance park some time during the past few days. The saurians were brought here last summer from Louisiana by George M. Brown, who believes alligator farming can be profitably followed in the mild climate of the north Pacific coast. The management of the city parks coaxed him to let the city care for the reptiles, and he placed them, four in number, in a tank in the large Defiance park greenhouse. The alligators thrived and everything went well until a night or so ago, when two of the alligators clambered out of the warm ooze of the tank and getting their long, sharp noses through the mesh of the wire netting made shift to enlarge the openings sufficiently to get out into the greenhouse.

TO INVESTIGATE COURTS' CRITICS

San Francisco Bar Association May Start Contempt Proceedings.

(United Press Leased Wire.) San Francisco, March 17.—Critics of the supreme and appellate courts who have voiced publicly their dissatisfaction with the decisions of those two tribunals in quashing the extortion indictments against Eugene Schmitz are to be investigated by the bar association of San Francisco. Members of the association will meet Friday night to initiate contempt proceedings against the offenders, if the criticisms freely made since the courts rendered their opinions justify such action. George J. Martin, secretary of the association, who sent out the call for the meeting, announced that the subject to be discussed is the attack made by newspapers on the integrity of the courts. It is thought that the association may also take action against certain lawyers who have accused the supreme and appellate courts of exercising poor judgment in setting aside the Schmitz indictments.

DOZEN ORANGES FOR EACH TAR WITH FLEET

San Diego, Cal., March 17.—San Diegoans propose that each sailor in the fleet be presented with a dozen big oranges and a bouquet of flowers upon the armada's arrival here. About 16,000 bouquets and 200,000 oranges will be required.

SALEM'S BOOSTERS IN CONSOLIDATION

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Salem, Or., March 17.—At a formal meeting the Salem Young Men's Booster club accepted an invitation of the Salem board of trade to become consolidated with that organization. Henceforth Salem will have but one commercial organization.

FIFTY-FOOT GAP IN UMATILLA CANAL

Pendleton, Or., March 17.—In order to test the strength and capacity of the canal on the Umatilla project, the full head of water was turned into the canal Saturday. Below Echo a gap of 50 feet was washed out, the water rushing out over the flats. A large force is repairing the break. The head gate stood the test of high water to perfection. The head gate on the Furnish project was also found to be safe.
