

ALDRICH IS ROASTED BY LA FOLLETTE

Wisconsin Senator Declares Financial Bill Is Framed to Aid Malefactors of Great Wealth in Their Stock Gambles.

Standard Oil and Morgan Interests Same—One Big International Monopoly Will Be Result Unless Octopus Is Suppressed.

Washington, March 17.—Senator La Follette woke the senate up today with one of the most scathing attacks that has yet been hurled at the financial bill of his fellow Republican from Rhode Island, Senator Aldrich. He denounced the measure as one not of reform or benefit to the small banker and the honest business man, but as a cloak in which to extend more liberty and license to the stock gamblers and high financial jugglers of Wall street.

"It is not the people, charged with losing confidence, who are responsible for our present sad financial plight," declared the speaker, "but the autocrats of Wall street and the powerful members of the system" who brought this state of affairs about deliberately and knowingly and for their own profit and personal gain."

He then declared that the law making railroad bonds security for circulation was designed solely for the purpose of enabling men of the John D. Rockefeller and J. Pierpont Morgan stripe to control the country's financial system, and make possible the devouring of the entire system of legitimate commercial banking by the new fangled and illegal system of "financial banking."

He declared that the national banks use the interest in trust companies as a convenience for covering their own illegal actions. Asserting that the country is being slowly but steadily entrained in a financial octopus, he said that Senator La Follette charged that even today the Standard Oil and Morgan interests are virtually one. He asserted that 14 directors of the National City bank of New York, the Standard Oil's institution, are the heads of combinations representing and controlling 35 per cent of the industrial trusts of the country.

"As a result of this consolidation and interpenetration of interests and the approach of the one big international monopoly," declared Senator La Follette, "capitalists have multiplied their wealth beyond their ability to estimate with anything like a degree of accuracy. In the face of this the railroads, possibly the biggest gainers, have soundly lost. This is the result of a policy of wholesale reduction of service and wages in order to create an opinion against a rate law designed to curb their arrogance and greed. To further their own selfish ends they plunge a nation into the depths of financial depression and the horrors of 'hard times.'"

The little senator from Wisconsin then launched off in a humorous vein, and after having held his audience spellbound with his eloquence convulsed the audience with laughter, as he painted in a mock heroic style Rockefeller and Morgan dashing in melodramatically to rescue a country from a panic into which they have plunged it, resuing it because they wished to plunder it further.

BELIEVES CONGRESS WILL PASS UP WORK

Washington, March 17.—The handwriting is on the wall and Representative Underwood of Alabama has seen and interpreted it. "This session is going to do nothing," said he today. "The Republican leaders will pass the general supply bills for the country, ride to an early adjournment in the spring, and do nothing else. It is probable that not one of the president's recommendations will be enacted into law, and even currency legislation will go by the boards. As to tariff legislation, the messages of the president and the addresses of the speaker and Republican leaders generally show that the country is to be given no relief from that source."

supreme court. As far as their legal standing goes and their personal integrity is concerned, the judges of that court are the equals of any in the world. The chief justice, especially Justice Brandeis, is recognized as a man of the deepest learning and the highest personal integrity.

"I believe myself all this muchraking and talk of graft was instigated by the lawyers for their own benefit. The state has to hire lawyers to investigate the graft and those investigated have to hire lawyers to keep them out of jail. Therefore the lawyers catch them coming and going, fleecy and the others aren't in it for their health."

When asked what he thought was in the stocks of graft in San Francisco Father Yorke said there was just as much in them as there was in a hot-air balloon when the bag has been punctured.

Lawyers Get Rich.
"The lawyers are getting rich, and I suppose they need the money," said Father Yorke. "The chief was the wisest man of the lot. His commercial instinct came to his rescue and induced him to turn state's evidence. He saw that if he kept up the fight like Schmitz and the others are doing that the lawyers wouldn't leave him a penny to bless himself with."

"So far as Mr. Schmitz himself is concerned I will not state my opinion as to his guilt or innocence of the charges made—I have carefully refrained from doing that. I will say,

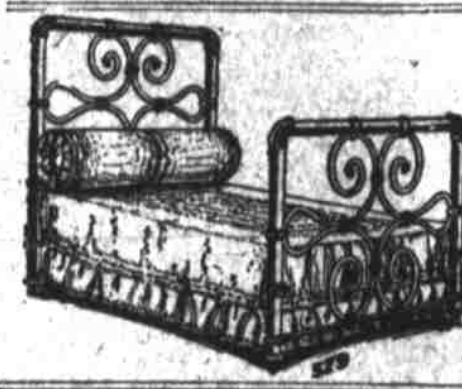
