

ALEXIS INSULTS FOREIGN CORPS

Haytian President Asked to Explain Why He Ordered Arrest of Consuls.

(United Press Leased Wire.)
 Port Au Prince, March 19.—President Alexis is to be called on by the diplomatic corps for an explanation of an order positively known to have been given last Monday for the seizure on that night of every diplomatic and consular agent on the island.
 Why the order was not executed has not been explained. The insult just brought to light, coupled with the entire attitude of the present administration, threatens to cause the president more trouble than was given him by the revolutionists. A formal demand for an apology will be presented and if quick action is not obtained marines from all the foreign warships now in the harbor may be landed. There is still much feeling among the blacks against all foreigners, and white people in the streets are recipients of every insult that the blacks can administer without precipitating an open clash.
 The Haytian government today is bringing a number of fresh troops into the city and strengthening all coast garrisons.

ACTION TO SECURE TOUTLE RIVER POWER

 Olympia, Wash., March 19.—Notice has been served on the state land commissioner that the Pacific Power & Railway company will petition the superior court for the condemnation and appropriation of the waters of the middle fork of the Toutle river in Cowlitz county. The company was incorporated in November by Portland and Illinois men for the avowed purpose of building an electric railway from Vancouver via Kalama and Kelso to Castlerock and from Castlerock to Spirit lake and into the St. Helens mining district. It desires appropriate rights for power purposes. The Weyerhaeuser syndicate is also interested in the river and is made a party to the action.

Car Service Over Madison Bridge Temporarily Suspended.

Until further notice, on account of the repairs being made to the Madison street bridge, passengers on the Sellwood, Mount Scott and Hawthorne avenue lines will transfer to and from the Portland Railway cars at Grand and Hawthorne avenues. Leaving time from Grand avenue will be eight minutes later than the time given in time card from First and Alder streets.
 Passengers for Oregon City, Cazadero lines and the Oaks will take cars at East Morrison and Water streets. The leaving time at East Morrison and Water streets will be the same as is now shown in time card leaving Portland from First and Alder streets.
 An extra service, marked "O. W. P. Transfer Car," in addition to the Waverly, Woodstock and Brooklyn cars, will be maintained by the Portland Railway division over the Morrison street bridge to Grand and Hawthorne avenues, in order to take care of the passengers on the Sellwood, Mount Scott and Hawthorne avenue lines.
 Oregon City, Cazadero and the Oaks cars can be reached by taking any car crossing Morrison street bridge.

TEXANS THREATEN TO EXTERMINATE NEGROES

 Austin, Tex., March 19.—A race war that threatens serious consequences is imminent at Haskell county seat of Haskell county, according to a telegram just received by Governor Campbell from the mayor of that town. The mayor stated that a mob of white men had formed to drive the negroes out of the county and that a conflict was about to occur. He urged that rangers be sent immediately to prevent violence. The governor immediately issued orders directing detachments of rangers to proceed to the scene of trouble at once.

 Montevideo, March 19.—The government has resolved to send a military delegation to study Chilean methods, as it has already done with a delegation to Rio de Janeiro.

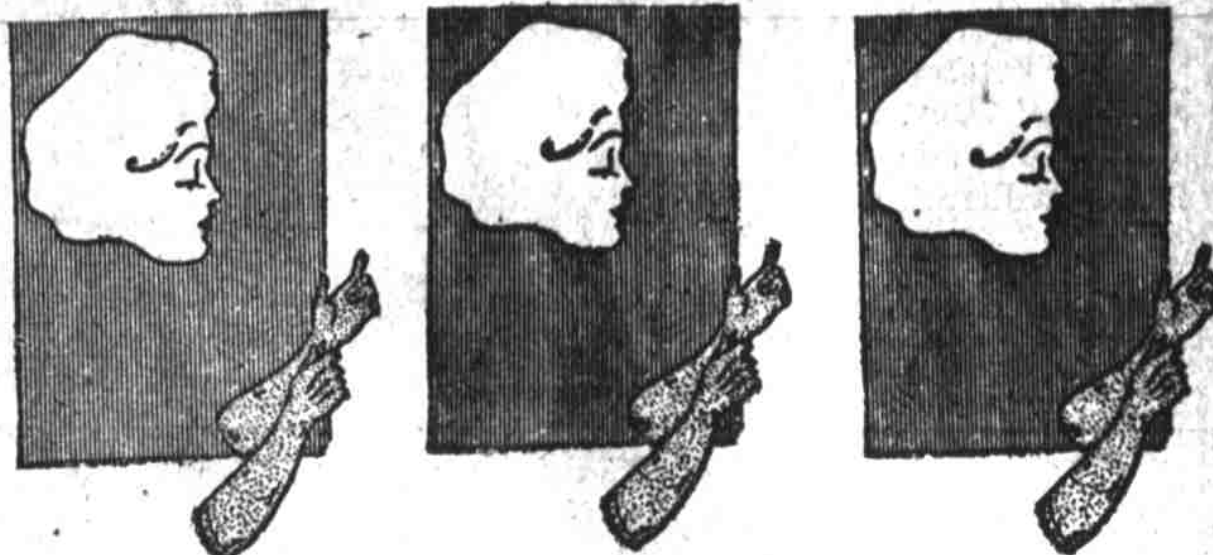
