STANFORD MA EXEMPT RIOTERS

UNIVERSITY ISSUES DEFINITIVE REPLY TO REBELLIOUS STUDENTS

EXCITEMENT ON CAMPUS

College Authorities Make Explicit Reply to Demand for Reinstatement of Trouble Brewing Twelve—Investigation Being Held.

Stanford University, Cal., March 20.—The student affairs committee today refused to reinstate the 12 suspended students, suspended Tuesday night for the recent demonstration against the faculty's action on the drinking question.

The action is a bold defiance to the 300 students who have intimated they would "strike" if the reinstatement was not made. The statement of the committee made public at noon today was as follows: "We sincerely appreciate the sentiment of the resolutions submitted by the student body, but we see no reason why we should retract what we have done, and will follow our former policy."

There is every indication that the faculty will take drastic measures should the rebellious students fall under the ban, it is probable that wholesale suspensions and expulsions will result.

Meeting Tonight. A meeting of the student body will be called for 8 o'clock tonight. It is likely that there will be any radical action.

BIG FLEET WILL VISIT JAPANESE

American Cabinet Decides to Accept Personal Invitation Extended by Mikado—Port to Receive Warships Not Designated.

Ambassador Takahira Informs President That the Ruler of Little Brown Men Is Anxious to Have Vessels Pay Him Visit.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Washington, March 20.—The great Atlantic fleet, on its famous trip around the world, will stop at a Japanese port. This was made possible by the action of the cabinet today in accepting a personal invitation of the mikado to the fleet to visit Japan.

The invitation was received yesterday by Japanese Ambassador Takahira and presented to the state department today. Directly after its receipt it was announced that the cabinet would discuss the advisability of accepting it at today's session.

COUNSEL FIGHT IN DUNBAR SUIT
