NEW ROAD PREPARES FOR CLIFFS BUSINESS

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Cliffs, Wash., March 20.—The first freight operating crews are now establishing their headquarters at Cliffs. This marks the beginning of an era of the labor and business usually found at important division point towns. The railroad company is not yet fully prepared to handle all the business satisfactorily that comes to this point. H. P. Frank, a rancher and stockman living near, came in to arrange to ship several carloads of stock, but was disappointed in not finding the stockyards or loading chutes in readiness. He will wait a few days for the accommodations to be arranged for. Otherwise he would have to cross the river and ship via the O. R. & N.

Senator Bryan Ill. (United Press Leased Wire.) Washington, March 20.—Senator Bryan of Florida, the youngest member of the upper house, suffered a severe hemorrhage today and is in a serious condition. His physicians say that his recovery is doubtful.

ONLY 800 REPLY TO GAS QUESTION

East Siders Apparently Not Anxious to Pay Bills Near Home.

"Out of a possible 8,000 but 800 of our patrons on the east side have returned us the cards sent out with last month's bills answering our inquiry as to whether it would be desirable to them for us to establish pay stations on the east side," said Manager Klein of the Portland Gas company, this morning. "There seems to be some misapprehension regarding the plan that makes many of them hesitate."

"Make it plain that it is our desire to make the payment of bills on the east side optional only. If it is not convenient to pay the bills on the east side the east side patrons may pay them on the east side or on the west side. Much dissatisfaction with the plan has been expressed to me and other members of the company because the water department makes the payment of east side bills on the east side compulsory."

Sacramento, Cal., March 20.—The promise of a full pardon that was made to George Sontag 16 years ago, when he was sentenced to prison for life for turning state's evidence, has been kept by the authorities. Sontag, one of the Fresno bandits, is free today, having been released by acting Governor Porter yesterday, and he will be restored to citizenship at once.

BORN IN WASHINGTON IN EARLY FIFTIES (Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Castlerock, Wash., March 20.—William Nelson Huntington, who died in East Portland, Wednesday, was born at Monticello, in this county (Cowlitz), in January, 1852. He was the son of Harry D. Huntington, who had crossed the plains to Oregon in 1848 and settled at Monticello in 1849. He was a member of Castlerock lodge, W. O. W. His death was caused by dropsy; he had been an invalid for many months.

IDAHO LAND BOARD ADVERTISES SALE (Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Boise, Ida., March 20.—The state land board has advertised a sale of state lands in Fremont county, to take place at 10 o'clock a. m. on Saturday, March 21. The tract to be offered for sale embraces about 2,500 acres and is appraised at from \$10 to \$11 per acre. It is expected that a large number of people will be present at the sale.

INFANTA EULALIE ESCAPES SCANDAL

Spanish Royalty Will Not Be Dragged Into McKee Divorce.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Paris, March 20.—Royalty heaved a sigh of relief when the announcement was made that Hart McKee, the Pittsburg millionaire, and his beautiful wife, formerly Cornelia Baxter of Tennessee, who is suing him for divorce, decided not to drag the name of the Infanta Eulalie of Spain into the splotchy proceedings. It is said that the beginning of the troubles that led to the divorce suit dated back to the time the Infanta offered to present McKee and his wife to the king of Spain for a consideration of \$200,000. Mrs. McKee balked at the proposition and the first serious quarrel occurred between her and McKee. While Mrs. McKee still feels very bitter toward the Infanta she agreed to drop her name to avoid what might be a royal scandal if it were mentioned in the proceedings.
