

# ACCUSE CHICAGO MAN OF ANARCHY

## Russian Arrested on Charge of Having Hurled Bomb at Czar Nicholas.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Chicago, March 20.—Suspected of having sought the life of the czar by throwing a bomb at the Tsarsko-Selo palace in St. Petersburg more than a month ago, Andrei Zito, late of Chicago, has been taken into custody by the police. The crime the police believe Zito is guilty of took place within 20 yards of the palace. The instrument of destruction was thrown by a man closely resembling Zito. The bomb fell short of its mark and exploded, killing a civilian. The bomb thrower vanished. The Russian secret police, however, are said to have traced him to New York and then to Chicago, where they arrested him at 648 Austin avenue. Zito was arrested at that address.

## Breaks His Hip Rescuing Note-bearing Flask, and Love Follows.

Rising Sun, Md., March 20.—Misfortune followed Rowland S. McVeigh of Conowingo, when he rescued a flask with a note in it from the Susquehanna river. In seizing the bottle he slipped and broke the socket of his right hip. Now, however, McVeigh is happy. His engagement with Miss Mary S. Erb of Sunbury, Pennsylvania, the owner of the flask and writer of the message is announced.

It was a year ago the romance began. McVeigh was surveying along the Susquehanna, when he saw a strange object floating by. He grasped it, and in doing so fractured his hip. Despite the pain he held on to his prize. Upon his return from the Baltimore hospital, where he remained a long time, while a silver pin was inserted in his hipbone, he opened a correspondence with Miss Erb. The wedding will take place in the spring.

While they would not make any statement as to their destination, it is understood that they are surveying the extension of the Oregon Electric to Albany. The managers at Portland say they are preparing to build south of Salem this summer, but will not ask for a franchise through this city until they are ready to begin construction work and know where they want to locate the line. They also declare that this survey has nothing to do with any of the Welch property or franchises, but is entirely independent of the Portland, Salem, Eugene & Eastern, which is projected and promoted by the Welch syndicate at Portland.

# ANTI-SALOON FIGHT IN SOUTHERN OREGON

Knodell of Portland, a representative of the Anti-Saloon league, lectured in Klamath Falls this week, speaking four times on Sunday, and as a result of his visit, a committee was formed, and representatives will be appointed from each precinct to act with the central committee. # SUICIDE USES THREE AGENTS OF DEATH

## Girl Takes Gas, Wood Alcohol and Chloroform to End Life.

(United Press Leased Wire.) San Francisco, March 20.—So determined was Annie Kennedy, a domestic, to end her life that she employed three agents of death—gas, chloroform and wood alcohol—and the trio caused her death 30 minutes later. The young woman was employed in the home of William H. Collier, superintendent of the United States Indian Supplies warehouse, and left home about noon. After purchasing a quantity of wood alcohol, chloroform and securing a gas tube, she went to Oakland and registered in a hotel. Half an hour later she was found dead. She had swallowed the alcohol and chloroform and her teeth were closed over a tube through which gas was flowing. No reason for her act is known by members of the Collier family.

# WEATHER REPORT

An immense high pressure area occupies the central portion of the United States, and a disturbance of considerable area, but of no great intensity, is central over northern California. This disturbance has caused showers in extreme northwest. Rain has also fallen over a strip of territory extending from the lower Mississippi valley to the middle Atlantic states. Light snow has occurred in eastern Colorado, northern Minnesota, South Dakota and the north Pacific states and the Missouri valley and cooler in the Atlantic and west in the states.

The indications are for showers in this district tonight and Saturday, except in southern Idaho, where fairer weather will continue. It will be warmer tonight east of the Cascade mountains.

The river at Portland will fall rapidly during the next 48 hours.
