The United States civil service commission announces examinations April 23 to secure eligibles from whom to make appointments to the following positions: Laboratory helper in the laboratories of the bureau of chemistry, department of agriculture, at a salary of \$600 per annum; that of wagon maker at the Indian school at Salem, salary \$120 per annum; cooper, engraver in the coast and geodetic survey, at \$900 per annum.
