

PEOPLE MUST VOTE ON 19 INITIATIVE MEASURES

People Will Have Opportunity to Override Boss Rule and Corruption in Oregon Politics for All Time to Come by Voting Intelligently.

Acting under a law passed by the last legislature, Secretary of State Benson has issued a pamphlet containing a copy of all measures referred to the people by the legislative assembly, referendum ordered by petition of the people and proposed by initiative petition, to be submitted to the legal voters of the state for their approval or rejection at the June election. The pamphlet also contains the arguments that have been filed favoring and opposing certain of the measures.

In the act authorizing the publication of these measures, the secretary of state is required to furnish one copy of the pamphlet to every registered voter in the state.

The following is the form in which each of the 19 measures to be voted on will be printed on the official ballot:

For an amendment of section 22 (evidently intended to be section 21) of the constitution, changing the compensation of members of the legislature to \$4000 for each regular session and \$3000 for each special session instead of \$3 per day and mileage. (Section 22 provides the time when laws take effect, and the proposed amendment is, therefore, wrongly numbered.)

For an amendment of section 3 of article 14 of the constitution to permit the location of state institutions elsewhere than at the seat of government by act of the legislature and vote of the people.

To increase Supreme Judges. An amendment to article 7 of the constitution by increasing the number of judges of the supreme court from three to five, until otherwise provided by law, and authorizing the legislative assembly to provide by appropriate legislation for the exercise by the circuit courts, of the probate jurisdiction heretofore exercised by the county courts, and for the transaction of county business by and before some appropriate body or tribunal.

For amendment of section 14 of article 3 of the constitution changing the time of holding the regular general biennial elections from the first Monday in June to the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November.

An act providing that in all counties, the sheriff shall have the custody of prisoners committed to or confined in the county jail and such prisoners shall be worked at such places and for such times and in such manner as the county court may direct, and that in counties of over 100,000 inhabitants, the salaries of guards and jailers shall not exceed \$90 per month, and the price of meals furnished prisoners shall be 12 1/2 cents each.

For an act requiring railroads and other common carriers to grant free transportation for the use of Oregon national guards, and sheriffs, as a condition precedent to acquiring land for corporate purposes by the exercise of eminent domain, and for the payment of mileage for such free transportation.

An act to amend section 3522 of Beilinger and Cotton's annotated codes and statutes of Oregon by increasing the annual appropriation for the support and maintenance of the University of Oregon.

For equal suffrage constitutional

amendment, permitting women to vote on equal terms with men.

For an act prohibiting fishing for salmon or sturgeon on Sunday from January 1 to October 1, also in the Columbia river only from October 1 to December 31, also in the navigable channels of Columbia river at night, also at any time in Sandy river and in Columbia river west of west line of range 3 west, near Astoria, and east of west line of range 16 east, near Celilo, and limiting seines anywhere in the state to 150 fathoms long and 1-6 fathoms deep, and providing penalties.

For constitutional amendment giving additional and exclusive power to cities and towns, within their corporate limits, to license, regulate, control and tax or to suppress or prohibit theatres, racetracks, poolrooms, bowling alleys, billiard halls, and all other amusements, subject to the provisions of the local option law of the state of Oregon.

For constitutional amendment providing that all dwelling houses, barns, sheds, out houses and all other appurtenances thereto; all machinery and engines used exclusively for manufacturing purposes; and all other improvements on farms; all live stock; all household furniture in use, and all tools owned by workmen and in use, shall be exempt from taxation in addition to exemptions now authorized by the constitution.

The Recall. For an amendment to article 2 of the constitution, giving the voters power to call a special election at any time to discharge any public officer and elect a successor.

A bill for a law instructing members of the legislature to vote for and elect the candidates for United States senators who receive the highest number of votes at the general election.

For constitutional amendment giving the people power to make laws for election of public officers by majority vote instead of plurality; to provide that political parties and voters' organizations shall be prohibited from presenting in all offices filled by the election of two or more persons, and that a voter shall vote for only one person for any office, and may indicate a first, second, third, etc., choice; and to provide for a simple method of precinct residence and registration.

A bill for an act to limit the amount of money candidates and other persons may contribute or spend in election campaigns; declaring that any person who corruptly uses money and undue influence in elections and punishing the same; prohibiting attempts on election day to persuade any voter to vote for or against any candidate or candidates, or any measure submitted to the people; to protect the purity of the ballot; and to prohibit any person from knowingly corruptly using money and undue influence in elections and punishing the same.

For an act prohibiting, after August 25, 1908, fishing for salmon or sturgeon at any time, by any means, except hook and line, in the Columbia river or any of its tributaries, or in the Columbia river or any of its tributaries, at any place up stream from its confluence with hook and line during the spawning season.

For constitutional amendment providing for the conduct of jury and venire jurors, and that no person can be charged in the circuit courts with the commission of a crime or misdemeanor, until he has been tried by a grand jury, except when a court holds an indictment to be defective, the district attorney may file an amended indictment.

A bill for an act to create the county of Hood River out of the western portion of Clatsop county, providing for organization and fixing the salaries of the officers thereof.



JAPS ACTUALLY HELP COREANS

D. W. Stevens Says Case Is Parallel to That of the Philippines.

(United Press Leased Wire.)
San Francisco, March 21.—The Japanese are doing for the Koreans what the Americans are doing for the Philippines, and the Koreans are being benefited by this protection, declared D. W. Stevens, diplomatic adviser to the Korean council of state, who has arrived here on a leave of absence. No man is more familiar with conditions in Korea and Japan than Mr. Stevens, who has held his present position since 1894, and for years before that served as Tokyo agent of the American legation at Seoul. "Before the war the Korean government was spending \$200,000 yen annually on a standing army, and 60,000 yen on public education," continued the diplomat. "This will give you some idea of Korea's condition before hostilities between Japan and Russia were declared. The peasantry was ground down until nothing but a bare existence was left from their labor, and the official class was corrupt. The peasants have welcomed the Japanese, while the official class has not."

PROHIBITIONISTS OF MARION IN CONVENTION

Salem, Or., March 21.—The Marion county prohibitionists held their convention yesterday, named five men for representative candidates and passed resolutions favoring the following: Total prohibition; the voting on local option by counties; curbing of trusts and railroads; laws in favor of the laboring classes; woman suffrage; direct election of senators; representation of minorities, and urging on congress the necessity of an interstate commerce law preventing the shipping of liquor into "dry" states.

MIGHT BE TOO MANY FRESHMEN NEXT YEAR

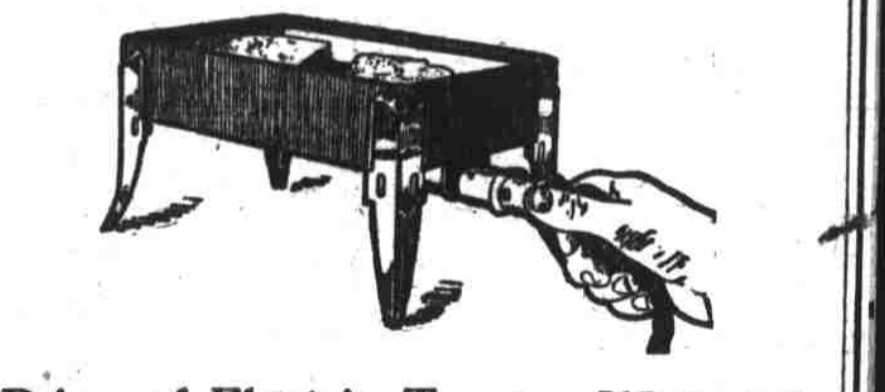
