ALBANY TO RAISE BIG BOOST FUND

At Least \$10,000, and Good Start Made at the Booster Banquet.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Albany, Or., March 21.—At the big booster banquet last evening 300 guests were present. Speeches were made by Mayor Wallace, F. J. Miller, P. R. Kelly, Fred Mueller of Portland, Messrs Garland of Lebanon, Johnson of Corvallis, and Van Winkle. Governor Chamberlain and Tom Richardson of Portland delivered the principal addresses. Nearly \$7,000 was raised as a booster fund. The greatest enthusiasm prevailed. The unanimous purpose was manifest to make Albany the greatest city of the Willamette valley. It is expected the booster fund will be raised to \$10,000 at least.

The banquet marks the beginning of new things for Albany. The slogan "For a Greater Albany" was adopted.

GAD STICK SHARPENED FOR SIX ATTORNEYS

When the grievance committee of the State Bar association concluded its session at noon yesterday it had decided to bring disbarment proceedings against six lawyers before the supreme court. The papers will be filed as soon as they can be prepared.

Several of the cases brought before the committee for hearing were dismissed. Among these were those of Richard M. McCann, who was charged with retaining money belonging to a client, and E. W. Bartlett of La Grande. In the McCann case the committee felt that an effort had been made to make a collection agency of it. It was shown that Mr. McCann had forbidden in question to the wardens of the penitentiary to be held by him until the prisoner was released. Bartlett, who had been charged with attempted extortion, had been cleared of the charge on a second trial, and the committee felt that the case should not be considered by them.

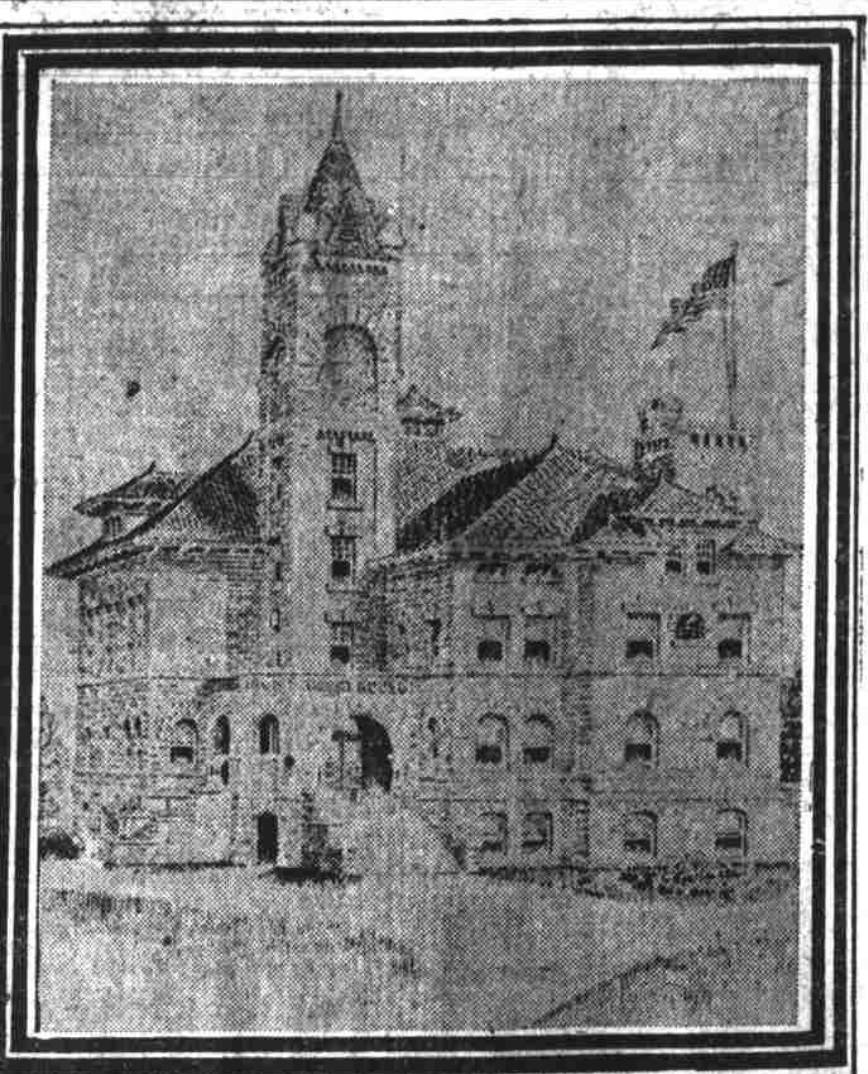
The committee will meet again within 30 or 60 days to take up its unfinished business.

Architect's Drawing of Courthouse to be Erected at Baker City

MR. HOBBO, STAY AWAY, BETTER NOT COME TILL SOME OTHER DAY

Officials of the Northern Pacific railroad have notified the local police department that there is now encamped near Goble, on the Columbia river, as desperate a gang of hoboes as has ever made its appearance along the line of the road. The Portland police are warned that these men are liable to make their way into this city at any time, and that their advent may be marked by acts of crime and violence.

In their report the railroad officials say that the hoboes boldly raid the freight trains that stop at Goble, steal coal for their fires and commit such other acts of vandalism as suits their fancy. They pay no attention to the protests of the trainmen, and their boldness and numbers makes it impossible for the trainmen to make any attempt to forcibly prevent the depredations.

Upon receipt of the warning Chief Grimsbacher issued an order to have all incoming trains watched, and if any of the hoboes attempt to enter the city to give them the kind of reception they deserve. Both night and day trains will be watched, and it is safe to say that all brakebeam-riders will get something other than the glad hand.

MAYOR ASKS CAR COMPANY TO MAKE TEST OF LIVERPOOL FENDER

Mayor Lane has addressed a letter to B. S. Josselyn, president of the Portland Railway, Light & Power company, calling his attention to the fact that one of the company's cars recently caused the loss of another life, and asks that the company install a Liverpool fender and guard upon one of its cars as an experiment.

While Mayor Lane does not attach the responsibility of the death upon the company, he asks that in order to arrive at a solution of the fender question the company try one of the Liverpool designs. The mayor explained that this type of fender is not patented; that it is simple and inexpensive, and easily constructed.

Mayor Lane explained in his letter to the railway president that the fender and guard has proved uniformly successful in England and Europe, where it is extensively used, and for that reason asked the company to conduct an experimental test with one.
