French Bark Eugene Pergaline Arrives With Cargo From Antwerp.

EXPERIENCES THREE DESTRUCTIVE STORMS

Cargo Carrier Joins Fleet in Harbor After Six Months' Run From European Port—American Ship Berlin Here to Load for Alaska.

After having weathered three terrific storms the French bark Eugene Pergaline reached the harbor yesterday afternoon with a cargo of cement and coke from Antwerp. She was six months and a week making the voyage. The last storm was encountered near Columbia river and it was so severe that for a while it was feared the vessel would never reach port.

The Pergaline left Antwerp October 2 and fell into her first rough weather when a few days out in the channel. The storm continued with increasing fury but finally dropped behind and from then on smooth sailing was enjoyed until off Cape Horn where a gale was raging when the windjammer came within sight of land. The weather was clear so that the rocks of Terra del Fuego could be plainly seen in the distance. Shortly after leaving the Horn the bark spoke a large steamer and the German bark Paris, the latter bound for Antwerp.

The third and worst storm was encountered when a few weeks off the mouth of the Columbia. Tremendous seas broke over the deck, the superstructure and threatened to do damage. But the vessel escaped practically without a scratch. March 9 the entrance to the Columbia was sighted but a fog came up and the captain deemed it advisable to stand out to sea. It was a week later that he returned and picked up a pilot.

The Pergaline is in to Balfour, Guthrie & Co. and will load wheat for Europe after having discharged the cement and coke.

Two windjammers will reach the harbor this afternoon, one being the American ship Berlin, the other the British bark Celticburn. The Berlin will be at Alsworth dock to load supplies for the Alaska-Portland steamer company on Saturday and the Celticburn comes under charter to Balfour, Guthrie & Co. to load wheat for Europe.

IN FROM CALIFORNIA.

Steamers Rose City and Roanoke Encounter Stormy Weather.

A high-class concert was given on board the Roanoke in the city. Captain Kidston, as she came up the river last night from San Francisco. Among the 200 passengers on board were many who could do stunts for the entertainment of their fellow-passengers that would be hard to beat, even from the vaudeville stage.

The weather has been very stormy coming up the coast and few of the passengers left their staterooms until the smooth water of the Columbia was encountered yesterday morning. Then they came out to make up for lost time and it did not take long to arrange a good program for a concert to take place after dinner. Captain Kidston says that some of the after-dinner speeches were gems of the first water. The entertainment concluded with dancing in the social hall.

The Rose City reached her dock at 11 o'clock last night, but most of the passengers remained on board the other night owing to the stormy weather ashore. She brought a good-sized freight cargo.

The North Pacific Steamship company's steamer Roanoke reached Martin's dock early this morning with 100 passengers and a good freight cargo from San Pedro, via San Francisco and Escondido. Captain Damann reports having encountered stormy weather along the coast.

BLOWS GALE AT CAPE.

North Head Feels Worst of Blow Early This Morning.

North Head, at the mouth of the Columbia, was swept by a howling gale this morning and the water was lashed into a mass of foam, according to a dispatch received from there by the weather bureau. Lookouts reported that the wind here attained a velocity of 72 miles an hour.

At that particular time it was blowing from the southeast, but by 8 o'clock the wind had veered around to the southwest and quieted down to 15-mile breeze. Lookout warnings were displayed at the cape early this morning but steamer Alliance bound for Coos Bay passed out before the blow had time to create much of a disturbance on the bar.

The storm was felt to quite an extent in the local harbor, but no damage was caused. None of the ships at anchor in the stream dragged their anchors. The weather bureau records show that the maximum velocity of the wind here this morning was 23 miles.

SWORE FALSELY TO GET LICENSE Attorney Charges Perjury and Holds Up Transfer of Erickson's Privileges.

Charging that the license of the Erickson saloon on Burnside street between Second and Third had been secured through perjured testimony and fraud, Lawyer C. V. Dolph asked the liquor license committee of the city council yesterday afternoon to withhold the transfer of the license from Hugo Frits, the alleged owner, to Eugene Froesner. Upon motion of Councilman Vaughn, action on the license was postponed by the committee until its next meeting. Mr. Dolph is the attorney of Mrs. Frances Frits, the first wife of Hugo Frits, and has a judgment in his client's favor against Frits. In trying to collect the judgment Mr. Dolph brought attachment proceedings against the saloon moved to allow the transfer of the license to Frits because of these facts the license was illegally granted, and therefore the committee could not transfer it. In a statement to the committee Mr. Dolph said that Frits appeared before the committee and swore to false statements in which he said that he was the owner of the place and made other false representations to the city officials. Mr. Dolph held that because of these facts the license was illegally granted, and therefore the committee could not transfer it. After a discussion as to the ownership of the saloon in which Councilman Driecoll moved to allow the transfer of the license until its next meeting, Councilman Vaughn wanted to revoke the license and throw the matter out of the council.
