Some of these expressions have been gathered together as tending to show the source from which Mr. Cole will derive a large part of his support at the contest for the nomination and subsequent to that for the election in June. In talking of Mr. Cole's candidacy, Captain J. Sladen, clerk of the United States district court, had the following to say:  
"I am glad that James Cole is to be a candidate for the office of prosecuting attorney for this district, and I trust he will receive the votes of all friends of law and order. His record as assistant United States attorney for the past two years was distinguished by marked ability, industry and impartiality. He is one of the salt of the earth, and if elected will fill that office honestly and vigorously. ## COMMERCIAL CLUB AT MAEGLEY JUNCTION

Upbuilding of District Is Object of Latest Organization on Peninsula.

The Maegley Junction Commercial Club was added to the list of east side clubs last night. Maegley Junction includes all that district that lies between Dawson street and the Columbia river and Haven and Adriatic streets, and the northwest boundary line of the city. Its special object will be the upbuilding of this district and the club will work in harmony with other peninsula clubs toward this object.  
R. G. Brand was elected president; W. J. Peddicord, vice-president; J. D. Mentz, secretary, and Mr. Cobb, treasurer. M. C. Van Tyne and R. G. Brand were chosen delegates to the Peninsula Federation of Improvement clubs.  
As soon as the north bank road is able to route its trains through the cut on the peninsula Maegley Junction will at once assume an important relation to the city. Already the new track of the Portland railway to St. Johns is being extended down Wall street to a new bridge across the cut of the Seattle, Spokane & Portland railway—the north bank road. When the cut is completed all St. Johns cars will thereafter be routed over this bridge within a few blocks of the central portion of Maegley Junction.

## SCORES WATCH MAN IN HIS DEATH AGONIES

Stranger Takes Poison and Struggles on Sidewalk of Plaza Block.  
More than a hundred persons witnessed the death agonies of an unidentified man who selected a bench in Plaza block at the place to carry out

his determination to end his life by his own hand. An ounce of carbolic acid was the means selected for self destruction.  
The tragic scene was enacted shortly after 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon, at which hour there were perhaps five score people in the little park. The stranger had been occupying one of the benches for several hours, attention being attracted to him by his dejected attitude and the fact that he paid no apparent attention to his surroundings.  
Those who occupied seats near the man noticed him change his position from one bench to another shortly after 3 o'clock and then saw him raise a small bottle to his lips. A moment later the man fell to the ground and writhed about in great agony, though he did not permit so much as a groan to escape from his tightly closed lips.  
Dr. Damman, who had been hastily summoned by some one, arrived at the man's side within a few minutes, but not soon enough to do anything to save the life that departed 10 minutes after the poison passed the man's lips. The body was removed to the establishment of Coroner Finley, two blocks away.  
Nothing was found upon the man's person that would serve as a clue to his identity. He was wearing an inexpensive, plain, and apparently belonged to the army of unfortunates who are classed as "the unemployed." The body will be held by the coroner for some days on the chance that it may be identified.
