## EAST SIDE WILL HAVE TO HURRY WITH PLANS

### Business Clubs Slow About Offering Street Decorations for Carnival.

Not much encouragement for routing one of the big Rose Festival parades on the east side is being received by the festival management from the different east side clubs in the way of arches and other promised decorations. The East Side Business Men's club has been doing its utmost to prevail upon the clubs to erect arches but no club has yet announced that plans are under way for such decorations. The United East Side clubs have again and again endorsed the idea but further than that little has been done.

## ROCKWOOD AFTER NEW HIGH SCHOOL

Rockwood district wants a high school. A new school building is to be built soon at Rockwood and the people of the district want it enlarged so that it may include several higher grades. There has been some talk of establishing a high school in east Multnomah and it is believed Rockwood is centrally enough located for the site of a school. Other towns, of course, are pulling for the high school. The plans for a building at Rockwood for the public school call for a \$12,000 structure.

# THREE DAYS' RECORD FOR SALES OF \$250,000

## Realty Transfers Largely Made Up of Small Property Sales.

Realty transfers filed for record during the first three days of this week, amounted to about \$250,000, all of which, except a \$100,000 acreage sale in the packing-house district, represents comparatively small transactions. The only deal in inside property reported during the week was the conditional purchase by Moy Bow Wing of a 25x38-foot lot on the west side of Second street, 50 feet south of Yamhill. The property was taken over from Samuel E. M. Lott by a 15-year lease with the privilege of buying at the expiration of the lease for \$15,000. H. L. Keas closed a deal yesterday with G. W. Rees for the purchase of a residence on the corner of Melinda avenue, between Washington and Flanders streets. The house is a modern two-story frame of attractive design and was sold for \$8,500.
