

DECISIONS NOT FINAL

Railroad Commissioner Aitchison Thinks North Carolina and Minnesota Cases Are Not So Far Reaching as Supposed.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)
Salem, Or., March 26.—Railroad Commissioner Aitchison commented, in part, as follows, regarding the recent decision of the United States supreme court, which prevents the proceeding by any state court or officer in establishing rates after the matter has been taken before a federal court:

"Without having the text of the decision, it seems to me the decisions in the North Carolina and Minnesota cases will not have as far-reaching an effect as might be feared. The doctrine that neither the legislature nor a legislative commission can make rates which the courts cannot review has been well established for many years. The North Carolina statute was overturned because the only review provided was in a criminal proceeding where excessive penalties would be the result if the statute was upheld. The point in the Minnesota case was that the federal courts might stop the state officers from enforcing the statute while the judicial investigation as to its constitutionality was in progress, and afterwards.

ESPEE PAYS C. & E. NINETEEN-SIX TAX

Marion County Republicans Promise to Obey Will of the People.

CAN NOT STAND BANK DOORS NERVOUS STRAIN ARE OPENED

David Starr Jordan, President of Stanford, Is Taken Ill Suddenly.

San Jose, Cal., March 26.—A veil of mystery has been thrown about the illness of Dr. David Starr Jordan, president of the Leland Stanford university, who was suddenly stricken in this city late last night and who is now confined in the residence of Judge J. F. Leib, a member of the board of trustees of the university.

Beyond the mere statement that Dr. Jordan had rested easily last night no information was vouchsafed by members of the Leib household today. Not even the nature of the patient's illness would be given out.

It is believed that Dr. Jordan's illness is as serious as first reports would indicate, but it is thought by many that the present turmoil at the university has more or less to do with his indisposition. He has been under an intense mental strain since the storm broke on the campus and those who have observed him have felt that a break down was inevitable.

While it is denied that the university troubles have brought about a collapse, it is not unreasonable to believe that they have had considerable effect on his mental and physical condition.

RUEF'S IMMUNITY CONTRACT GONE

New Indictments Against Calhoun, Ford and Former Municipal Boss.

San Francisco, March 26.—The three indictments found last night against Abe Ruef, Patrick Calhoun and T. J. Ford, charging them with having bribed supervisors in connection with the trolley franchise, were formally returned today. The indictments, which are virtually duplicates of the true bills found by the grand jury, charging that on May 10, 1906, Ruef, Calhoun and Ford jointly offered bribes to Daniel Coleman, John J. Furey and F. P. Nicholas, members of the board, to vote for the trolley franchise.

It is understood that the purpose of the prosecution in causing the return of these indictments was to completely nullify the immunity contract upon which Abe Ruef is making his fight.

BRYAN CHOICE OF INDIANA

Democrats Denounce President, Secretary Cortelyou and Governor Hanly.

Indianapolis, March 26.—William Jennings Bryan was today endorsed for the presidential nomination by Indiana's Democrats, in the state convention held here, and John W. Kern, one of the state's leading Democrats, was the nominee of the convention for vice president.

The platform condemns the action of Secretary George B. Cortelyou for issuing the Panama canal bonds in an effort to check the "money panic" and for depositing government funds in New York banks. One plank disapproves of the efforts of President Roosevelt to dictate the nomination of his successor and another opposes the Aldrich and Fowler financial bills.

The delegates also voted to insert a plank declaring that Governor Hanly was incompetent to head the state government.

After the platform had been disposed of the delegates mixed up in a fist fight, in which the second ballot was being taken to nominate a candidate for government. The fight became general and a few black eyes were afterwards in evidence. Order was finally restored.

Edward B. Raud, an anti-Taggart delegate, was ejected because he offered such strenuous objection to the announcement of the result of the second ballot.

Cedar Rapids, Ia., March 26.—The Bryan Democrats controlled the state Democratic convention here today and endorsed the Nebraska commoner for the presidential nomination.

BANK DOORS ARE OPENED

Knickerbocker Trust Company Receives Many Deposits and Is Again Solvent—Sign of Renewed Prosperity.

New York, March 26.—With \$3,000,000 stacked up ready to meet all demands, the Knickerbocker Trust company threw open its doors for business today for the first time since it was closed last October. At noon, the hour of the reopening, hundreds of depositors were in line, but many of them were there for the purpose of depositing savings. Officials of the institution declared today that sufficient money is available to pay everyone of the 20,000 depositors should they all be anxious to withdraw their money. The bank has assets of over \$50,000,000 and the liabilities are slightly less.

Bankers and financiers generally say that the reopening of the Knickerbocker is perhaps the best sign of returning prosperity that has been seen since the beginning of the money panic. The plans for the rehabilitation were completed after four months' labor on the part of a committee of depositors.

Under the plan the depositors will receive today 10 per cent instead of their deposits in full. If they care to withdraw all their money they may do so at intervals covering a period of two and one-half years.

GRAFTERS ROB CITY OF CHICAGO

Municipality Takes Action to Recover Large Sum From Traction Co.

Chicago, March 26.—Sensational disclosures of alleged wholesale theft and graft in the water bureau by city employees today led to a shake up in the bureau and a complete reorganization.

Thefts of tools, meters and materials furnished the workmen, which were pawned or sold by employees were conditions said to have been disclosed to Superintendent McCourt.

Another result of the revelations was the rendering of a bill for \$27,592 against the Chicago Union Traction company, the amount representing city water used in five years by the company and unpaid for. The city was defrauded of this amount, it is alleged, with the connivance of city employees.

PRIMARIES WILL DELAY WARSHIPS

President Asked to Keep Fleet From Entering Frisco Bay on Election Day.

San Francisco, March 26.—Realizing that the Atlantic fleet would be more of an attraction than the primaries to be held May 5, the general fleet reception committee has decided to wire to President Roosevelt the request of the Lincoln-Roosevelt league that Admiral Evans be ordered to delay his entrance to San Francisco until May 6. Friends of good government have learned that it is hard enough to get the voters to the primaries when there are no counter attractions. It is feared that if the fleet arrives on the day scheduled the good citizens will neglect their duty at the polls and leave the machine element in control.

Stockton, Cal., March 26.—Stockton has joined with the other cities in expressing a desire to have the fleet pay a visit, but unlike the other places it will be satisfied with a call from the torpedo flotilla alone.

In case the invitation which the chamber of commerce intends to send is accepted, the small fighting boats will encircle Stockton through the San Joaquin river.

The plan is to light up the harbor and hold a grand reception for the officers and men at the date that may be fixed later. If the boats cannot come, the officers will be asked to visit the city in launches.

KILLED SOON AFTER THIRTEEN DINNER

NIGHT RIDERS AGAIN AROUSED

Reported Truce Followed by News of \$50,000 Incendiary Fire After Raid.

Cincinnati, March 26.—Glossy following a report that a truce had been patched up between the independents and the tobacco trust, a band of "night riders" broke into the warehouse of the T. S. Hamilton company on the outskirts of Covington, Kentucky, shortly before daylight today, and fired the place. Half a million pounds of raw tobacco, valued at \$1,000,000, was destroyed.

The fire spread and destroyed an entire block of buildings. When the flames reached a cottage adjoining the warehouse, the raiders went in and carried out a cot on which Miss Carrie Feeley lay, and at the same moment later the roof of the cottage caved in.

Before starting their work the "night riders" cut every telephone wire in the vicinity. Eight young farmers, some of them of the best families in the county, are today under surveillance.

NEW INTEREST IN VANDERBILT ROW

New York, March 26.—New interest in the separation of Alfred G. Vanderbilt and his beautiful wife has been awakened by the report that the sympathies of the Vanderbilt family are on the side of the young woman and that then the mother of Alfred is opposed to his actions in the affair.

The elder Mrs. Vanderbilt, according to report, has sheltered her daughter-in-law in her Fifth avenue mansion most of the time since the separation took place while trying to induce her son to return to his wife.

Vanderbilt is determined to leave for London within a few days and so far he has not made any arrangement to see his wife before he departs.

JOHN BURNS SAYS ROOSEVELT IS WRONG

London, March 26.—John Burns, labor leader and president of the local government board in the cabinet, has taken issue with President Roosevelt on the race suicide question.

"I do not plead for a desolating flood of babies," he said, speaking to the delegates to the national conference on infant mortality. "I attach more importance to quality than to quantity. Let us first look properly after those we have before starting an agitation to produce a greater number. Let us mitigate the slaughter of innocents under a year old, and cease our cruel neglect of those above that age before shouting to the nation to give us a higher birth rate."
