The United States civil service commission announces an examination on April 13 to secure eligibles from which to make certification to fill vacancies in the position of fish culturist at Boise, Idaho, Montana, salary \$540 per annum, Leadville, Colorado, \$600, and another at Tupelo, Mississippi, salary \$540, and other vacancies as they may occur in the bureau of fisheries, department of commerce; and to fill several vacancies in the position of trained nurse (both male and female) at board and quarters, and vacancies requiring similar qualifications as they may occur in the Philippine service.

As a result of injuries received by falling from a railroad trestle near La Center, Washington, a few days ago, James McIntosh, a logger, died at Good Samaritan hospital at 5 o'clock yesterday afternoon. The man was brought to the city two days ago for treatment, neither he or his friends believing his injuries to be of a serious nature. Very little is known of McIntosh here beyond the fact that he has a considerable amount of money on deposit in a local bank. The body is in charge of the coroner and will be held pending a decision of his friends or relatives as to its disposition.

Central W. C. T. U. met Wednesday afternoon. Mrs. Rockwood spoke on the work of the city library. She spoke of the children's room and the effort to lead them to read the best books, and referred to the work in the county. There are five reading rooms and several deposit stations. Mrs. M. M. Steeth spoke on the Union Signal, the organ of the National W. C. T. U. Mrs. Margaret Houston spoke on the White Ribbon Review, the Oregon paper. She also talked about the Crusader Monthly, for the boys and girls. Next week will be the monthly of Dr. Esther Pohl will address the members on "Hereditry."

Councilman Baker introduced an ordinance at yesterday's council meeting to prohibit hawkers and vendors from operating in the downtown district. The reason given for introducing the ordinance is that the vendors line the streets and force merchants paying large rents into competition with them. Another reason is that the streets cluttered with the vendors from such stands. Councilmen Belding and Driscoll announced they would oppose the measure when it comes to the floor. The ordinance was referred to the license committee.

A Union Provident league with over 200 charter members was instituted at the Red Men's wigwam in the Seeling-Hirsch building Tuesday evening. Officers were elected and arrangements made for their installation and completion of the secret work of the order Tuesday, April 7, at which time an elaborate program of music and dancing featuring features will be rendered for the pleasure of the members. This society was organized by Portland business men and has its supreme offices in this city.

Information has been given the police by Patrolman Craddock that many of the cigar stands about town are evading the law in the matter of permitting gambling for cigars. A small mechanical dice shaking device is used, the score being kept by means of a card on which are printed numbers corresponding to the various combinations of the dice. Captains Moore and Glover have issued orders to the patrolmen under their command to put a stop to this form of gambling.

R. T. Williams & Co., lumber exporters of Portland, have sent Frank Williams to the South American coast in the interest of their trade. Williams has the advantage of being able to speak Spanish, an advantage seldom possessed by American commercial travelers, but always by their European competitors. Oregon lumber is generally sent to San Francisco to be resold there for the South American market. This is not the way of Seattle.

A. Bohlert has begun suit for \$5,000 damages against the Portland Railway company for damages for personal injuries which he says were received November 18, 1907, while he was waiting for a car at East Davis and Twenty-eighth street. He says the car slowed down as it approached and he had grasped the handles to get on board when the conductor gave the go ahead signal and left him, after wrenching and spraining his knee.
