New potatoes are coming in quite freely from California. While the stocks are generally of small size, they are of unusually good quality for this time of the season and are being offered in retail shops at 15c and 16c a pound.

The two severe advances which occurred in the price of sugar during the past week were rather costly to the consumer. Inasmuch as the rise in prices amounted to 60 cents per hundred pounds at wholesale, with a corresponding advance in the retail groceries.

While Oregon is paying just about what it costs to produce potatoes because of the enormous crop here the past season, conditions are just the reverse in the eastern and middle west states. There the crop was rather small the past season and prices are jumping upward in an endeavor to get where supply and demand meet.

Had any apparatus this season? If you have not, try some for Sunday and you'll be surprised at the fine flavor. Prices are still rather high, but most any one can afford a mess for Sunday.

Japanese Officials Believe Koreans Will Attempt to Start Reign of Terror.

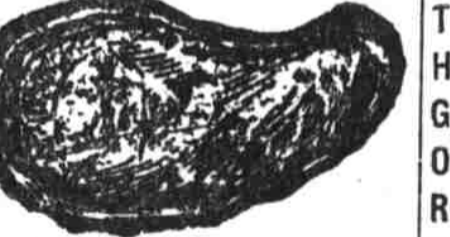
