

PEOPLE'S LIVES IN DANGER AT WOODLAWN SCHOOL

Inadequate Fire Protection Leaves Children in Jeopardy in Case of Conflagration—Business Men's Committee Finds Startling Conditions.

The committee of the Men's club of Woodlawn Methodist Episcopal church, which was appointed to investigate the condition of the Woodlawn school relative to fire protection, finds in its report that it is absolutely unfit for occupancy. The committee, which was composed of G. H. Rogers, James Griffith, C. M. Poley, William Newman and Louis E. Joy, asks that the old building be removed at once and a new brick or cement building erected in its place.

The committee recommends that hereafter all the school buildings of the city shall be made of brick or cement and that the city do away entirely with the system of hot-air heating, which is found to be a menace. The full text of the committee's report is as follows:

Bad Conditions Made.
The full committee visited the school Tuesday morning, March 10, inspecting all parts of both the old and new buildings, and finding the following specific objections to existing conditions:

First—The smokepipe from the furnace in the basement of the new building passes within three and three-quarter inches of woodwork, the heat at some time having been sufficient to blister the paint and draw the pitch.

Second—This smokepipe is entirely within the furnace room by frame partitions, is entirely inclosed and cut locked. The switchboard for the electric wiring of the building is also located in this room. The objection to this arrangement is twofold, in that it hides from quick detection an incipient fire, and places the most probable cause of fire where the forced circulation of air would quickly spread it to all parts of the building through the hot-air pipes.

Third—The switchboard consists of a piece of asbestos fastened to the wooden building while the requirement of the most lenient regulations governing the installation of electrical appliances is for a slate or marble board. The switchboard should be so located that in case of fire the fire janitor could sound an alarm and shut down the power, and that the requirement of a quantity of dry inflammable material which constitutes a menace to safety, an opening in the chimney in the basement is securely closed. Many of the windows are broken out, offering opportunity for stray sparks and mis-making cigarettes.

Fourth—Some of the stoves are in bad condition and without proper protection.

Exit Walled Shut.
Sixth—The small door opening to the Union avenue is walled up because not considered necessary for or-

derly use, and because it is eight feet above the ground and unprovided with outside steps. In a fire drill test it was demonstrated that the emptying of the old building through the one exit required 44 per cent more time than the emptying of the new building through two exits. It would scarcely be practicable to use this exit for fire drill purposes without outside steps, but it ought certainly to be available in case of emergency.

Seventh—The fire alarm in the old building can only be sounded from the top floor of the new building or from the steps of the old. This is a very inefficient arrangement in view of the fact that the most probable origin of fire is in the basement. The new building has been promised by the electrician for the school board.

Eighth—There are no fire escapes on either the old or the new building. We believe that these should be provided throughout the building. The new life saving means is beyond any question of argument and the failure to provide them would seem to amount to a neglect of the duty of the school board.

Ninth—The heating and ventilating pipes of the new building are not fully equipped with dampers and cut-off devices. This should be remedied in order to cut off all draughts of air from the basement in order that the fire in the case of fire.

Brick or Concrete Needed.
In addition to the faulty conditions above enumerated, your committee believes that it is entirely feasible for the city of Portland to provide in future only solid brick or concrete buildings for school purposes. We also believe that no public school should be heated by the hot air system, the mechanical principles of which tend strongly, first, to the origin of fires, and second, to their rapid spread to all parts of the building.

A steam or hot water system properly installed eliminates both of these objectionable features, and in addition has the added advantage of economy of fuel over the hot air system.

We believe that our community is entitled to the removal at the earliest possible moment of the old building, which is absolutely unfit for occupancy, though the requirement of the present new building as it is intended at the time of its construction; the placing of a hydrant at the corner of Union and Grand avenues, and the school under adequate fire protection, and a prompt remedy for all faults as pointed out in the first part of this report.

The fire drill given for the benefit of the committee was carried out by teachers and pupils in a quick and orderly way, clearing the new building with 216 pupils in 45 seconds and the old building with 146 pupils in 45 seconds. The regulars of the school board call for fire drill once each week.
