

IS TABOOED BY FULTON

Oregon's Senior Senator Fails to Climb Into Statement No. 1 Band Wagon and Returns to Astoria—"Pat" on Corvallis Speech.

Senator Fulton will not climb onto the Statement No. 1 bandwagon, but will ride to either victory or defeat on the neutral platform which he has adopted and which he says he will stand by until the end.

Since his return to Portland a number of his friends have been urging the senator to come out on a Statement No. 1 platform and make the race from this time on as an advocate of Statement No. 1. It has been represented to him that he is not adverse to the principles of Statement No. 1, that he is not opposed to the doctrine and that he is about to be double-crossed by the members of the Hodson-Beach-Bailey-Reed machine. These friends have asked the senator to allow them to make some concessions to the Statement No. 1 forces in Multnomah county and put the senator in line with that wing of the Republican party.

Just prior to the departure of Senator Fulton for Astoria he had a conference with Thomas McCusker at the Imperial hotel, at which the attitude of the senator in regard to Statement No. 1 was discussed. At that time, however, Senator Fulton reiterated his stand in regard to his attitude toward Statement No. 1. He said that while he was not opposed to Statement No. 1 and in fact personally believed in the principle, yet he did not consider that he could as a candidate for the senate, ask the candidates for the legislature to pledge themselves to a principle which was with them a matter of principle. He said that because of this belief he would still maintain his position as set out at the opening address of his campaign in Corvallis.

When the bride recovered from her surprise she blushed and bowed and told the audience that it was all true.

MYSTERY SURROUNDS DEATH OF COUPLE

(United Press Leased Wire.) Sandusky, O., March 28.—The deepest mystery still prevails tonight as to which of the couple actually fired the bullets that ended the lives of Mrs. Kathryn Hughes, a pretty widow, and E. J. Glendenning, a traveling man, whose dead bodies were found today in the Van Dusen apartments here. A revolver with two empty chambers was found upon the floor about half way between the man and woman. It might have fallen from the hand of either and it is probable who fired the shots will never be known.

The double tragedy was discovered by Mrs. Harry Hickman, a sister of Mrs. Hughes, who occupied apartments directly below those of the dead woman. Glendenning has a wife and two children in Cleveland.

Just how, when and why the shooting occurred is a mystery the police have about abandoned as hopeless. Notes upon the floor indicated that Mrs. Hughes had love affairs with other men. Whether these have any bearing upon the case is not known.

PLANS COMPLETE FOR BENEFIT BALL

Knight Templars Arrange for Monster Entertainment for Next Month.
