

FULL TICKET NOMINATED

Statement No. 1 Is Platform of Representative Body of Citizens of the County—Altman and Mahone Complete the List.

B. C. Altman of Gresham and L. D. Mahone of Portland announced their candidacy for the Republican nomination for representatives to the legislature this morning, coming out flatfooted on a Statement No. 1 platform in response to the requests of the long list of business men of the city who persuaded Ben Selling, H. R. Albee and the remainder of their associates to become candidates.

With the appearance of Mr. Altman and Mr. Mahone as candidates the full number of candidates on a Statement No. 1 platform necessary to fill all the vacancies in the senate and house have entered the race.

The Statement No. 1 candidates who have entered the contest as the result of the appeal of the business men and well-known citizens of the city and county are now as follows:

For the Senate—Ben Selling, H. R. Albee, C. W. Nottingham, Dan Kellner and A. H. Willett.

For the House—James Abbott, B. C. Altman, Fred J. Brady, J. C. Bryant, W. J. Clemens, K. C. Couch, J. F. Cassidy, L. M. Davis, E. J. Jaeger, L. D. Mahone, C. J. McDonald and A. W. Orton.

Friends of the Statement No. 1 candidates are optimistic regarding the outcome of the primary campaign and the June election. They point to the fact that only a short time ago it was believed that there would be no Statement No. 1 ticket in the field. Now before the full ticket has appeared in the field the sentiment of the county has shown itself so strong in favor of the Statement No. 1 as to threaten the dissolution of the Hodson-Beach-Balley-Reed machine slate and to bar out the entrance of the Lockwood-Portland Republican club ticket into the field.

W. H. Chapin, C. E. Lockwood and McKinley Mitchell who attended to the circulation of the petition for the club ticket, have given up in despair. They would not interest the men whom they desired to become candidates for the legislature because most of these men had already sworn allegiance to the Statement No. 1 ticket.

In the Hodson-Beach-Balley-Reed camp there is much wefulness of spirit. Sichel is sorry he started into the fight but believes he will have to stay with it to the bitter end. George McMillan is not trying to boost his campaign and is in reality sorry to be tied up with the machine combination. So is R. S. Farrell, who would like to quit but does not like to let down L. E. Crouch would rather be in other company. Altogether it seems to be a pretty disgruntled bunch.

The Union Republican club is sitting still, when it is not boosting a little now and then unofficially for E. B. Caldwell, Dr. Ernest Drake and L. J. Hicks. It has refused to indorse any candidates, however, much to the sorrow of C. W. Hodson, who sought that indorsement, but failed to land it.

INSANE DOCTOR CREATES SCENE

Powerful Big Man Resists Efforts of Deputy Sheriffs in Hamilton Building.

Dr. H. Volp, arrested on a charge of insanity, created much excitement in front of the Hamilton building yesterday by his powerful resistance to Deputy Sheriffs Frosbatal and Beatty, who were trying to induce him to enter an automobile to go to the county jail.

Dr. Volp is a morphia user and lately has been under the delusion that people are trying to kill him. The deputy sheriffs tried strategy when they went to his office telling him they wanted him to go to the county jail. He refused to go and they could protect him from his enemies. He demanded that they prove they were deputy sheriffs, and upon their showing the badges he agreed to go.

At the foot of the stairs the insane man excitedly inquired of passers by whether the men were officers, and Walter Holman, who was passing, misunderstood him and took him to the jail. Volp at once began to struggle to escape, and as he is well built, weighing 200 pounds or more, the struggle attracted the attention of a large crowd.

Finally he was put in the auto and taken to the jail, where another struggle took place. Volp then clutching the coat of Dr. Williamson, the alienist who was called to examine him. It was with great difficulty that his grasp was broken, at the same time avoiding injury to either himself or Dr. Williamson.

Dr. Volp is said to be a graduate of Heidelberg university, and among the possessions he is most proud of are scars on his face made by swords in duels in student days.

Dr. Volp was taken to the asylum at Salem at midnight last night. At the jail he became much subdued and kept asking what he had done, declaring that it was terrible to be condemned to death without a trial. He told the alienists that people were trying to kill him because he was born a Protestant and embraced the Catholic faith. He insisted on taking a satchel to the jail with him and this was found to contain a large quantity of morphia, he evidently fearing to be separated from the drug he craves.

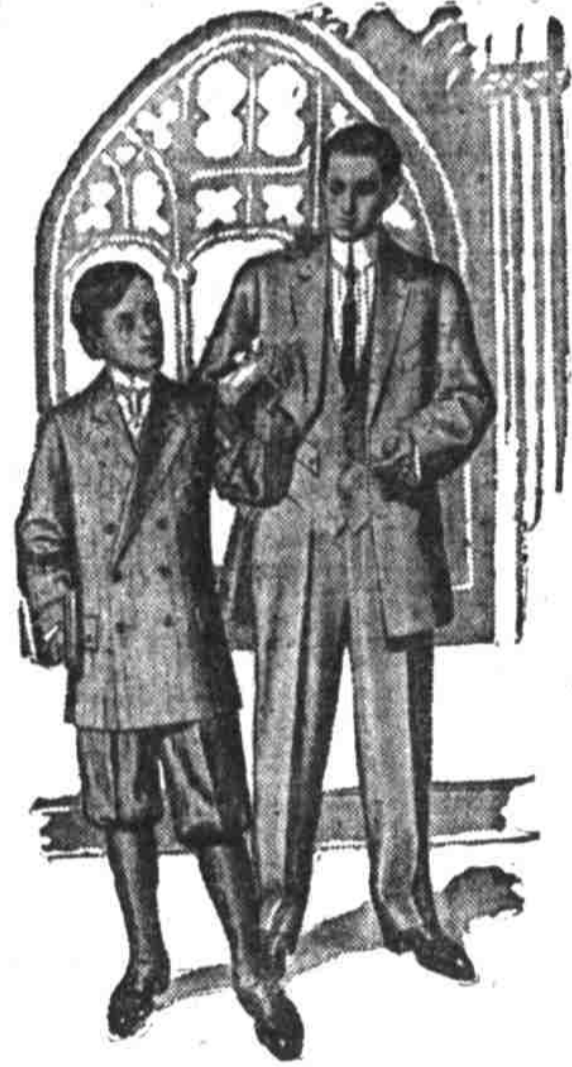
BOOKLET SHOWS LINES OF OREGON ELECTRIC

Small Farm Tracts Are in Great Demand Along This Line.

Compiled from various sources, the booklet just issued by the investment company, 24 Stark street, shows the farming lands in the Tualatin valley, the lines of the Oregon electric and Southern Pacific, including the latter's cut-off from Beaverton to Oswego by which it is expected to take the team railroad off Fourth street in the city of Portland. This involves building a new bridge at a point between Oswego and the west bank of the Willamette and Milwaukie on the east shore.

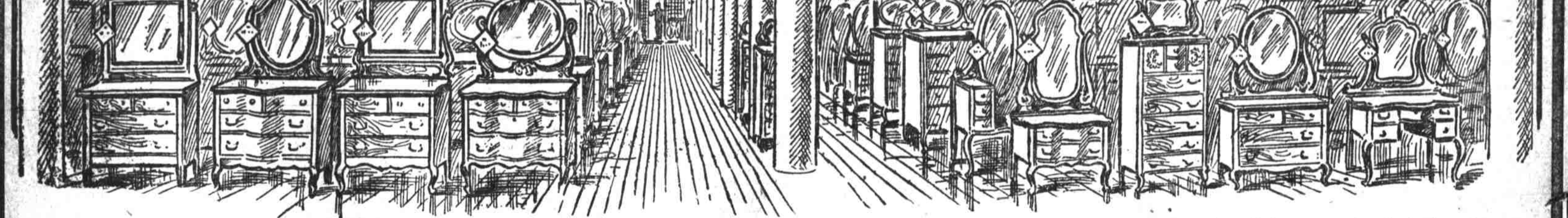
