They had supposed that the territory comprised in the precinct, which was formerly a portion of precinct 74, could vote on the question of prohibition this year. This is the territory in which, before the saloons were voted out, there were two drink shops, and the wet contingent has been confident that it could carry the new precinct, 60.

CAKE TALKS TO GEORGE CONSER HOOD RIVER MEN DEAD AT HEPPNER

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Hood River, Or., March 31.—Supporters of H. M. Cake and Statement No. 1 gathered here last night to hear the address of the aspirant for the Republican nomination for United States senator. There was a good sized crowd, and enthusiasm was abundant.

Mr. Cake refrained from any criminality or reference to his opponents; nor was it necessary for him to deny any charges of corruption, political or otherwise, that have ever been made against him.

His address was a plain and earnest advocacy of the popular election of United States senators, and an appeal for Republicans to remain loyal to their party. In the course of his remarks he urged that it is in the best interest of the people that the Republican party continue in the ascendancy, and that a continuation of the policies of President Roosevelt means a great deal not only to the country at large, but to Oregon in particular.

I believe in the popular election of United States senators because I believe in the people," he said. "I am willing to trust the people, and every other candidate should be willing to do the same. Let the people elect their senator in June, and let the members of the legislature carry out the people's wishes as expressed in the June election."

MRS. THARP AND HOLGATE HELD Affinities Alleged to Have Deserted Spouses in Jail at The Dalles.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) The Dalles, Or., March 31.—Mrs. Lydia Tharp and Chesney W. Holgate, who are alleged to have left their respective spouses at Sheridan and who, it is charged, have since been living as man and wife at Vancouver and various other places in Washington, Idaho and Oregon, were arrested at Clatsop county, Oregon, and Justice of the Peace Douthett yesterday bound them to the circuit court, the former on a charge of polygamy and the latter on a charge of almost equal gravity.

The complaint was sworn out by the husband of Mrs. Tharp. Both parties are now in jail, under \$1,000 bonds, which they were unable to give.

NEWPORT LAMENTS EMIL FREY'S DEATH

Funeral services were held at the Presbyterian church at 2 o'clock Sunday, conducted by the Christian Endeavor society of which he was a member. CAKE WILL OPEN WASCO CAMPAIGN

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) The Dalles, Or., March 31.—The opening gun of the campaign for the office of Justice of the Peace in Wasco county will be fired by H. M. Cake here tonight, when he will address the voters of Wasco. The Dalles is the center of his campaign for United States senator. This will be the first speech of the campaign.

Registration in Wasco county, which has about 4,000 voters, so far amounts to 2,353 out of 36 precincts. There are registered Democrats, 282; Democrats, 47; Prohibitionists, 29; Socialists and 60 independents.

DR. ROCKEY CALLED IN STEVENS' WILL SUIT

(United Press Leased Wire.) Washington, March 31.—Representative Lilley today submitted to the congressional committee investigating his charges that the Electric Boat company used improper methods in influencing legislation, an exhibit tending to show that Senator Butler received from that concern a total payment of \$12,368.65 for services rendered.

Lilley argued that such a sum was extravagant as legal fees and intimated that Butler was employed because it was thought he could influence legislation favorable to the boat company. He then repeated his request that expert accountants make an examination of the books of the accused company and made a demand that Admiral Capps be recalled to the stand to testify as to the cost of submarines. Lilley said he was not satisfied with the questions put to the admiral while he was on the stand.

MRS. LAKIN CAME TO LANE IN SIXTY-FOUR

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Eugene, Or., March 31.—Mrs. Sarah E. Lakin, wife of David Lakin, died at her home in Eugene yesterday from grip, at the age of 69 years. She was born in Adair county, Mo., and came across the plains to Oregon with her first husband, M. T. Branstetter, in 1864 and settled west of Eugene in Lane county. Mr. Branstetter died in 1883 and the widow was married six years later to David Lakin. They had three children and six grandchildren. Mrs. Lakin leaves the following children: Mrs. Fannie Hanovian of Portland, J. Clinton and William Branstetter of Eugene, and Asa, Frank and Etta Branstetter of Portland. She leaves a sister, Mrs. Mildred Donaldson, a sister-in-law, Mrs. W. W. Withrow, of Portland, and a brother, Clinton Withrow, of Portland. She was a member of the Presbyterian church. The funeral was held today and interment in the I. O. O. F. cemetery.

MRS. E. M. BOWER HURT IN RUNAWAY

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Eugene, Or., March 31.—Mrs. E. M. Bower, a traveling saleswoman for a Portland house, was thrown from a horse and severely injured yesterday. She was being driven from Eugene to Coquille. As the buggy crossed the railroad at Coquille, the bolt which holds the singletree, came out and the singletree hit one of the horses on the head. Both horses began to kick and run and the driver ran them up an embankment to stop them. The buggy turned over, throwing the occupants to the ground. Mrs. Bower's limbs were badly cut and bruised and she was injured elsewhere. She is now confined to her room in a hotel here.

USED WOODEN LEG TO BEAT INDIAN ON HEAD

An indictment charging Larkey Logan, an Indian, with manslaughter was returned by the United States circuit court grand jury this morning. Two other indictments in postoffice cases were also reported to Judge Wolverton. Logan, during a drunken row on the Siletz reservation, March 10, stabbed Willie Garnier, another Indian. Garnier died two days later from the wounds.

It was shown that during the fight Garnier struck Logan, knocking him down. Afterward Garnier, according to several witnesses, used his wooden leg to pound Logan on the head. Owing to these details the jurors decided that Logan should be indicted for manslaughter instead of murder.

Logan is now in the Multnomah county jail. Several days after Willie Garnier died an attempt was made at Toledo to shoot Logan by another of the Garnier boys, Frank Swope of Toledo is Logan's attorney.

TWO APPEAR IN BANKRUPTCY COURT

Two bankruptcy petitions were filed with the clerk of the United States district court this morning. The first was that of Frank L. Price, a Polk county farmer, whose liabilities amount to \$4,965, his assets being estimated at \$27,398. Among the Price assets are patents, copyrights and trade marks, which, according to the petitioner, are worth \$20,000.

Peter E. Peterson, an Astoria liquor dealer, was another petitioner requesting that he be adjudged a bankrupt. His liabilities are given as \$8,822, and his assets at \$1,822.
