

FRUIT MARKET'S BUTTER DECLINE NOTE LIKELY

Trade Looking for a Drop in Quotations Here Next Monday Morning.

Front street features: Potato demand is better. Eggs are not so firm. Poultry supplies are scant. Sales of flour are better. April hop contracts filled. Butter likely to drop Monday. Strawberries coming from the south.

Butter Likely to Drop Monday Morning.

There is every prospect that local creamery butter values will drop Monday morning. Receipts are showing a material increase from local sources. Outside city makers say they are getting much more cream than a short time ago. While the butter market is not exactly weak, the increasing supplies are not moving off near as well as expected and this in itself, if continued, will bring the market to a sharp point.

Strawberries Come From the South.

Daily arrivals of strawberries from the south are expected here within the next week. At the present time there are fair supplies in from Los Angeles. The shipments coming in pony refrigerators. The fruit is in fine shape and sells in the wholesale market at 25c per half pound box. Reports from California state that the fruit in that section will soon be ripe enough to ship and with the increasing arrivals and better quality, prices are expected to go lower here.

Eggs Are Not So Firm.

There is not so much firmness shown in the local egg market at this time. Sales along the street were generally 15c a dozen today compared with 16c to 17c during the past week. Receipts at this time are holding quite well but there is fractional decrease in the northern demand at the moment.

Poultry is Very Scarce.

Supplies of poultry are very scarce and not a goose or turkey is to be found along the entire length of Front street. For the latter there has been quite a good demand of late and prices have ruled higher in consequence of the few birds that are available. Because of the local shortage the larger retailers were forced to bring in stocks from outside the state. Hens and mixed chickens were in local supply during the past few days, but the buying for Easter by the larger retailers has cleaned up everything that came at prices that were not so good. Not so with the consumer, however.

April Hop Contracts Filled.

It appears that quite extensive purchases of hops have been made in Oregon during the past few days. The buying has ruled from 3 to 5c for most sales, with an occasional transaction of something select in quantity at 5 1/2c and 6c. Growers seem disposed to sell whenever given an offer, no matter what price is put forth by buyers. They are tired of holding stock of the 1907 crop and want to get the 1907 stock of their hands with the least possible delay.

Flour Business Somewhat Improved.

Because of the recent drop in prices, which the trade has expected for some time, and was holding off its purchases until the change actually happened, there has been somewhat of a revival in local flour trading, although export business is still unobtainable even at the recent decline.
