

# REFERENDUM MEASURES TO BE VOTED ON--O. 13

The thirteenth in the list of 19 proposed initiative and referendum measures to come before the people at the June election is the recall amendment to the constitution. The measure will appear on the ballot in the following form:

**Proposed Initiative Petition.**  
For an amendment to article 3 of the constitution giving the voters power to call a special election at any time to discharge any public officer and elect his successor. Vote yes or no. 324, 745, 325, no.

The measure as it has been submitted to the voters is as follows:  
**CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT.**  
Article II of the constitution of the state of Oregon shall be, and hereby is, amended by adding thereto at the end of said article a new section, which shall be numbered section 13, and which shall read as follows:

Section 13. Every public officer in Oregon is subject, as herein provided, to recall by the legal voters of the state or of the electoral district from which he is elected. There may be required twenty-five per cent, but not more than the number of electors who voted in his district at the preceding election for the purpose of the recall. recall petition, and in not more than two hundred words, the officer's justification of his course in office. He shall continue to perform the duties of his office until the result of said special election shall be officially declared. Other candidates for the office may be nominated to be voted for at said special election. The candidate who shall receive the highest number of votes shall be deemed elected for the remainder of the term, whether it be the person against whom the recall petition was filed. The recall petition shall be filed with the officer with whom a petition for nomination to such office should be filed, and the same officer shall order the special election when it is required. No such petition shall be circulated against any officer until he has actually held his office six months, save and except that it may be filed against a senator or representative in the legislative assembly at any time after five days from the beginning of the first session after his election. After one such petition and special election, no further recall shall be filed against the same officer during the term for which he was elected. The sum for the special election shall be paid into the public treasury which has paid such special election expenses, the whole amount of its expenses for the preceding special election. Such additional legislation as may aid the operation of this section shall be provided by the legislature, including provision for payment by the public treasury of the reasonable special election campaign expenses of such officer. But the legislature shall provide no such provision for any other or equivalent words in this constitution or any amendment thereto, unless construed to grant to the legislative assembly any exclusive power of law-making nor in any way to limit the initiative and referendum powers reserved by the people.

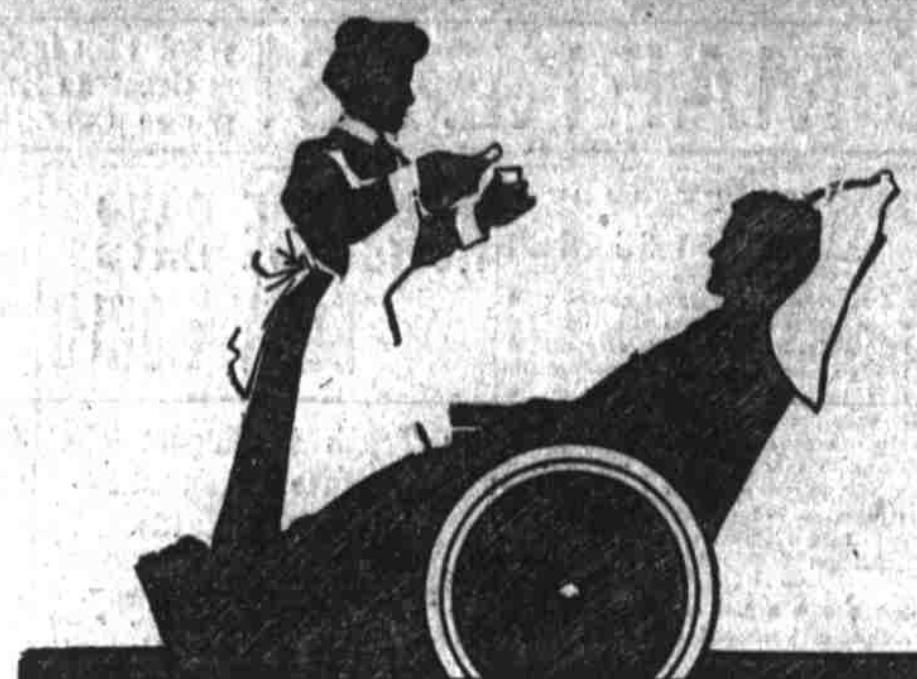
# PORTLANDERS BUY PANAMA TIMBER

## Local Investors Purchase Hardwood Tracts in the Canal Zone.

Dr. J. A. Pettit, who, with his wife and Mr. and Mrs. C. H. McNeelan of Portland, made a trip recently to Panama, has returned to Portland very favorably impressed with the country and the work that the United States government is doing there. Dr. Pettit and Mr. McNeelan also bought considerable timber land below the City of Panama, which he says can be secured with a good title and at very reasonable figures. The timber that Dr. Pettit bought is hardwood that will be very valuable within a few years. It is quite accessible and thought by Mr. Pettit to be a fortunate purchase. Although the tract acquired has not been surveyed the physician says his holding in Panama timber lands can be estimated in square miles much easier than in acres.

The party spent three weeks on the canal zone. According to Dr. Pettit the cities in the canal zone are cleaner and more sanitary than is the city of New Orleans. The work on the canal project is in a very satisfactory condition, and he says there is no longer any difficulty in obtaining labor. About 8,000 men were employed by the government at the time Dr. Pettit was in Panama. The steam shovels could excavate faster than the trains could carry away the dirt.

The material taken from the canal is used to fill the swamps in the canal zone, says Dr. Pettit. "There are no longer any dangers from yellow fever or malaria and the social life of the Americans at Panama is a pleasant one, and many people have gone there to live and will make it their home for the rest of their lives, undoubtedly." Dr. Pettit and his party journeyed far into the interior and saw how the natives live in their crude villages in the forests. The party went by way of New Orleans.

# Railroads Agree on Summer Rates and Dates to Eastern Points.

Summer tourist rates have been agreed to by all the transcontinental railroad lines, and the lines east of Chicago have coincided in the arrangement. The rates to Chicago will be \$1 higher on the round trip than were the 1907 rates.

The round-trip fare between Portland and Kansas City, Omaha, Missouri river territory or St. Paul will be \$60; to St. Louis, \$67.50; to Chicago, \$72.50. Going or returning by the Shasta route the fare will be \$15 additional for the round trip. Passengers may go or return by divers other routes including the northern lines without additional fare. The Harriman lines today announced the sale dates as follows: June 5, 6, 19 and 20; July 6, 7, 22 and 23; August 6, 7, 21 and 22. The going limit on these tickets will be 10 days. The time allowed for the passenger's return from starting point will be 30 days. Summer tourist rates will apply this year from eastern destinations and western destinations alike, giving the eastern tourist an opportunity to come to the Pacific Northwest for the delightfully cool summer months and mountain air, fishing excursions and the innumerable outdoor recreations that are making the Pacific coast country famous the world over.
